I largely agree with the C4 outcomes but the primary focus should be to preserve the natural environment rather than the experience of those visiting the area. Those visiting the area should be asked and expected to visit the area for what is there. There should be an emphasis to those living and visiting the area on preserving the natural habitat, wildlife etc. In particular this should be emphasised in the various water-ways. There should be a limit imposed on the number and speed of those using jet-skis and powerful boats on the lochs - they have a significant impact on birds and other wildlife on the lochs. There should be more signs by the lochs and lay-bys to educate those visiting the area of the wildlife and the impact of their behaviour to the natural environment. I have seen Osprey fly away from the loch because of jet-skis going at excessive speeds and the drivers acting in an anti-social behaviour. Local communities should be given more support and funding to deal with these issues. Rangers should be deployed on the lochs to moderate this behaviour. By and large the behaviour is from those visiting the area. The same applies to the roads around lochs and conservation areas. A significant amount of wildlife is killed on the roads as a result of people speeding or simply not caring. The speed limit around Loch Earn should be limited for the entire length of the loch as 50mph or 40mph

Only in part. People don't, for example, visit Yosemite Park in the US for the recreation activites which are manmade. They do so to appreciate the natural environment and cultural heritage. Some also enjoy sport which does not impact negatively on the environment or habitat. In my view the broad-brush reference to "recreation activities" is unhelpful. In my view, after "recreation activities" the words "in a way which does not have a negative impact on the area's outstanding natural and cultural heritage and allows them to appreciate an internationally-renowned landscape" should be added. The emphasis of the visitor experience should be to appreciate what is there.

There is already a serious problem with anti-social behaviour on Loch Earn (my locality) in the summer months by Loch users. Excessive noise, playing of music, over-powered jet-skis ALL need to be moderated and regulated first before there should be any question that more piers etc are made more accessible to visitors. I agree with VEP10, but board sports on Loch Earn also cause issues, are often operated dangeriously at excessive speeds and with loud music from the boats. By and large I do not consider that most of the VEPs sit well with the conservation and rural development priorities - they need to be reframed to return the emphasis to local communities and conserving the Park. Little or no regeneration, overgrazing from sheep and deer, damaged fencing and the old trees surrounded by non native conifers. I find it inconceivable that in one of our National Parks, there is such an important and beautiful area of old forest, that is being left to rot. The Estate forms over 20% of the total area of the Park. It is home to a diverse range of woodlands and their associated habitats. FES is committed to managing the improvement to and the development of the economic, social and environmental benefits that the Estate can bring to the Park in their role as a 'Partner in the Park'. For all 4 Conservation **Outcomes Forest Enterprise Scotland should be added** as a delivery partner

Priority 1 – Habitats Woodlands – FES will continue to involve the NPA Woodland Advisor at the brief setting stage of all their Land Management Plans (LMP). At this stage FES aims to increase the percentage of broadleaved woodland on the Estate in the Park. This initiative can be aligned closely to the priority of the

restoration of native upland woodlands on forest watercourse and loch edges. Areas of existing native semi-natural woodland will be enhanced through enrichment and also natural regeneration. In addition FES will continue to commit to the development and management of multi-benefit woodlands. In the main they will be mixed woodlands with an increasing range of non-native species that yield timber, in support of the timber processing sector, as well as a range of nonmarket benefits. These woodlands with their increasing diversity of species will also help build resilience to the possible impacts of climate change. Wetlands – The restoration of naturally functioning rivers through the continued improvements to watercourse and loch edges along Forest Habitat Networks will continue to help improve water flows and wetland habitats. FES will continue to be an active partner in helping to facilitate the delivery of aspects of the planned natural flood management solutions targeted to the woodlands around the banks of the Duchray river as part of Strathard Initiative Priority 2 – Species The Estate is extensive and diverse. It provides a real opportunity through sound management to impact significantly and positively on the biodiversity of the Park. With this in mind FES will continue to work: • On the removal of Rhododendron ponticum from the Estate. This will take many years and a significant input of resources. That said FES is committed to the long term removal of rhododendron from the Estate. We support the strategic approach advocated which must, given the significant costs involved, also be implemented on an affordable and cost effective basis with proper provision made for consolidation and maintenance of areas treated. Himalayan balsam, Giant hogweed and others will be tackled when discovered. • To visually monitor Grey squirrel presence, but in the main control will be left to Pine marten whose increasing numbers appear to reduce those of the Grey. • in support of the Red squirrel woodland stronghold which has been developed on the Estate in the woodlands of Cowal east of Loch Eck and including the woodlands around Ardentinny. Here small seeded broadleaved trees and Norway spruce will form part of the planting proposals to benefit Red squirrels. • To monitor the Black grouse leks at Loch Katrine and the surrounding area every year and to take management action when required to benefit their long term use. • To monitor the spread of Water vole following their successful re-introduction along the Duchray Water in Loch Ard Forest. Priority 3 FES will continue to engage at the initial brief setting stage for all their Land Management Plans with the NPA. This will allow opportunities to be taken, where possible and when appropriate, in support of conserving and enhancing qualities of wildness, cultural heritage features, tranquillity and dark skies on the Estate. Priority 4 Much of the Estate lies close to main trunk roads or public roads frequently used by tourists and others visiting the Park. The interaction of the woodland edge on the visitor's experience is acknowledged and is considered carefully by FES. With this in mind, visitor zonation is undertaken on all woodlands and is subsequently embedded in all Land Management Plans. FES will continue to assess woodlands in this way and when the significance of the woodland edge to those passing is such that development of the edge will improve the vicitor experience then these weedlands

improve the visitor expendince their those woodiands where the opportunity lies and resources are available will be managed to improve the experience. The Duke's Pass, Loch Arklet and Larach are roads where work continues to be done to manage the woodlands and their regeneration along the roadside to maintain or develop attractive views into and across the Estate. FES will work closely with Transport Scotland on the A83 at The Rest and Be Thankful where it is possible that new woodland creation may be carried out to help mitigate against future landslip. The on-going management of the mature woodland in this area will be done with due regard to slope stability. Measures will be taken to reduce the risk at time of felling and steps taken to stabilise the slope quickly following felling by restocking as soon as possible with appropriate native species. Priority 5 In addition to those areas of delivery outlined for Priority 1 and 2 FES has entered into a partnership with WTS, RSPB, FCS and the LLTNPA as part of The Great Trossachs Forest. This is a truly landscape scale project, which will deliver increased woodland cover, integration of grazing management and habitat improvements across the 16,000ha of the project area, lying at the heart of the Park. Priority 6 FES will work closely with the NPA to help with the facilitation of Your Park, building on the success achieved at Sallochy. The planned use of areas of the Estate by the NPA is underway at Loch Chon which has recently been developed as a campsite and is now being operated by the Park. Discussions around further possible development by the NPA of sites such as the 3 Lochs Forest Drive will continue to be positively engaged on by FES. Priority 7 As for Priority 1 - Wetlands. In addition FES will review their land holding and identify possible peatland restoration project in the Park. At present most resources are targeted to the Flanders Moss lowland raised bog project, which lies just out side the NPA boundary. Priority 8 FES will continue to engage at the initial brief setting stage for all their Land Management Plans with the NPA. This will allow opportunities to be taken, where possible and when appropriate, in support of Flood Risk Management Plans that cover the Park Priority 9 FES will be an active participant on Land Use Partnerships. FES brings significant expertise and experience in integrated land use through our practical work in a wide range of land uses on the Estate. The main tool for taking forward this work will be the implementation of our land management plans which take account of the wider landscape context as well as the management of the Estate – all within available practical and financial constraints. Priority 10 FES employs staff, contractors and has established leases with individuals and Deer Management Companies in a concerted effort to control the impact and reduce the number of deer on the Estate. All existing Deer Management Groups within the NPA area are attended by staff. An active role is taken in advancing the debate on the sustainable long term management of deer in the Park and the on-going protection of vulnerable habitats from grazing by deer and other herbivores. Wildlife staff will work closely with the NPA where required to support and promote the development of Deer Management Plans. Priority 11 FES will continue to engage at the initial brief setting stage for all their Land Management Plans with the NPA. These plans will look to deliver, wherever possible,

multiple environmental and social benefits alongside an economic return.

We welcome the proposal to review the core path plan in the light of experience as we believe that there is scope to deliver efficiencies and improvements to the core path network and its management to benefit both users and the practice of adjacent land management. We look forward to a positive dialogue to ensure that the core path network is both fit for purpose and clarity is established through path management agreements covering path improvements way marking, inspections, maintenance and promotion. Priority 2 – The mountains and the people FES will continue to actively support the nartnarchin project and its delivery where it is active on

There are a range of partnership models available which need to be explored in dialogue with partners and stakeholders to ensure a successful outcome. Priority 4 We recognise the significance of Scotland's long distance trails and the importance of the West Highland Way (WHW) in the network of Great Trails. We also recognise the need for the West Highland Way and other such trails to be managed and maintained to ensure that they are fit for purpose and deliver a safe and high quality visitor experience which delivers for the visitor economy. The Park Authority as the lead Access Authority with a significant stake in the LDR network and the WHW in particlular should continue to collaborate with the other Access Authorities with an interest in the WHW. Collectively, the Access Authorities should ensure that the management of the route is properly resourced and that agreements are in place with land owners and managers including FES to ensure that roles and responsibilties are clear. We therefore support this priority to seek improvements and look forward to replacing the existing dated agreement with the up todate version FES has shared with the NPA. Priority 5 FES recognises and supports this priority but is not in a position to provide resources for its implementation. We have an agreement in place and will continue to have a positive working relationship with SUSTRANS. We would welcome further dialogue with other organsiations and communities on future potential developments in line with the comments we have made against priority 4. Priority 6 A small section of this route falls on the Estate within the Park. FES will look to work with the NPA to facilitate the delivery of this section of the route north of Tyndrum. Any future management and maintenance should be agreed by the NPA in line with the draft agreement developed by FES for the WHW and other long distance routes. The development of core paths or LDR on the Estate needs to provide for a high quality visitor experience which is fit for purpose, safe and sustainable in terms of future management and maintenance needs. This should include anticipating operational constraints where land management needs including forest operations need to be reflected in the selection of routes and investment in purpose built sections of trail. Priorities 7-11 FES support these priorities where they apply to water bodies which form part of the Estate. Priorities 11 and 12 FES will continue to work with our existing private sector partners and tenants including private sector companies such as Go Ape, Forest Holidays and Camping in the Forest to deliver a wide ranging offer to visitors to the Estate. There are still further opportunities for development on the Estate, such as the site of the former Ardgartan Office and FES will look to make available such business opportunities through open fair and transparent tender competitions. Priority 13 FES will continue to play its part in ensuring that visitor information is high quality and up to date. FES has, and continues to invest in maintaining, low key informal public recreational infrastucture. Our main visitor facility, The Lodge at Aberfoyle, a listed building,

has been modernised to a high standard and subsequently attained and retained Visit Scotland 5 star accreditation. In the light of pressure on the public finances there is a need for future rationalisation and modernisation of the recreational facilities (especially trails) we manage to ensure that they are better alinged with the needs of visitors. Priority 14 The district will continue to work closely with the NPA in helping to facilitate the delivery of the Camping Management Zones on the Estate . Any agreements between NPA and FES for delivery of camping management on the Estate should be fit for purpose, sustainable and affordable. Priority 15 FES has no management role for any of the major Loch Lomond islands. Therefore has no role to play in determining an approach that will ensure, rightly, their sustainable and responsible use. Priority 16 FES will contiunue to manage the removal and responsible disposal / recycling of waste across all of their promoted sites and support initiatives to reduce waste and fly tipping on the Estate. Priority 17 The FES policy on car park charging will continue to be applied within the Park as a means of covering the cost of provision of FES facilities within the Park. Charges will continue to be made at those sites where there is an additional offer such as The Lodge or Sallochy. Prices for car parking will be kept realistic and in line with the offer at each site. We will seek to share experience and work collaboratively with the Park on traffic management and parking arrangements. Priority 18 FES support and will participate where appropriate. Priority 19 FES are committed to providing opportunities for a wider range of people to enjoy the Estate. We will also facilitate and work with others who wish to deliver educational opportunities and health activities on the Estate. FES has recently reconfigured the former Warden's House at The Lodge and this now provides an excellent flexible space that allows immediate access to the forest from an indoor education space. FES are looking to rent out this space and would happily collaborate with the NPA to help facilitate wider access to the Park. Priority 20 As set out in Priority 19, a focus of FES is to facilitate opportunities for volunteer groups to make use of the Estate The district will continue to work with the NPA in assisting the deployment of volunteers on projects that help deliver on the Park and FES's objectives. The Estate can provide an important outdoor classroom for both local and visiting groups. We will continue to support and facilitate this activity.

Priority 4 As stated previously FES seeks to be a responsible land manager including in the promotion of responsible access in accordance with the Scottish Outdoor Access Code. There are a number of path networks in woodlands close to settlements which we manage which provide opportunities for active travel in and between communities. Priority 5 FES working closely with Forest Research Agency who are active partners in the Strathard Initiative looking at, in part, the Duchray catchment. The project involves looking to undertake some natural flood management techniques, such as woody debris dams. FES are keen to explore opportunities to deliver similar projects and would look to adopt this where resourced, practicable and supportive schemes have been designed to reduce flooding. Priority 10 The district will continue to work with broadband providers through the provision of leasing land for the development of mast sites. Priority 14 FES is fully committed to working in partnership with affordable housing providers, such as Rural Stirling Housing Association. If there is an assessed level of need and suitable land on the Estate is available for development, FES will engage positively in the process of potentially selling the land to the Housing Association making use of our Community Asset Transfer Scheme. Priority 18 FES has developed, in response to the Scottish Government's Community Empowerment Bill, the Community Asset Transfer Scheme (CATS). The scheme is designed to ensure that community aspiration to own woodland or directly manage assets on the Estate can be met. Priority 19 FES will continue to have representation at the Callander Landscape Partnership.

An additional strategy which will be published during the life of the plan is the National Wild Fisheries Strategy, we believe that the inclusion of this national strategy would supplement the others listed. The Park has three rivers which are designated Special Area of Conservation for Atlantic salmon and the protection and development for recreational and rural economic benefits are part of the national strategy. C1 - We are fully supportive of a catchment based approach to management of habitats, they are a natural ecosystem. We consider that the term 'wetlands' is misleading. We believe that 'Our wetland habitats' is not a recognised definition for water environements including rivers, lochs, estuaries and coastal and should be 'Our freshwater and marine habitats'. Wetlands are freshwater areas which are bogs, peatland, mosses ie areas of land which are covered with shallow water (often not moving water). Whilst it is important to be consistent with definitions we believe that to attempt a 'catch all' in respect of the fresh and marine water environments is misleading. We believe that generally the term which should be used for river/loch catchments should be 'freshwaters' not wetlands. We are unsure what the term 'status' means in relation to INNS and flagship species. C2 - We believe that rivers should also be included in the description of the landscapes, but otherwise are supportive of the aims and outcomes. There is a measure of success which is related to

mitigation schemes it is not clear how these directly relate to the outcome (although we concur with the benefit of such schemes in themselves.) Would not an aim (measure of success) be that the percentage of land set aside as 'wild land' as determined in SNH wild land criteria does not diminish? C3 - We fully support the principle of better natural management to support the mitigation of climate change. Working with the freshwater environment, significant benefits can be achieved to buffer the effects of unseasonal and chronic events. We believe that we could add value to this outcome either as lead or in support. We are concerned that the Strathard Project is being set as an example of how this can be achieved - there are other models of delivery with better partnering on a wider scale which can deliver ecosystems services which it could be argued provide better value for money and more sustainable solutions. We note that the local authorities are not listed as delivery partners, we consider they are key for the delivery of natural flood management as they hold the funding and are responsible for the delivery of the flood risk plans. C4 - We would be keen to be involved in large scale catchment partners, as stated above, and believe that there are considerable benefits in the development of overarching catchment scale plans to which a number of wide ranging partners are involved. There are a number of mechanisms for delivery wide ranging benefits on a catchment scale and we welcome the aim for the NP to lead the way in this. The measures of success however relate to the outcome of delivery at this level and not the success of management and planning in this way. Catchment planning and delivery plans require a significant amount of time to set up and deliver and it is therefore unlikely in our view that the measures of success (as delivery successes) would be reached in the life of the plan. We feel that a measure of success should be that partnerships have been formed, plans agreed and that these are being implemented (at whatever scale is suitable for the works required and method of delivery). Our understanding of the Regional Land Use Partnership pilots is that these were very resource intensive and required substantial amount of stakeholder engagement at all levels and that this engagement and the concept of working at an ecosystem scale was of benefit in itself regardless of the delivery of particular projects. It was also highlighted in the pilot evaluations that whilst the lead for the partnership was the local authority that success required significant involvement of another body/bodies to make the partnership successful. We do consider that this type of initiative is both a logical and inclusive way forward.

We are broadly in agreement with the 11 conservation priorities. We would be committed to being a lead delivery partners in areas of delivering the aims and objectives. We consider however that RPID is a funder and whilst important in terms of delivery is unlikely to be a 'partner'. We would make the following more detailed comments: CP1 - As referred to above we do not consider that the term wetlands is representative of the water environment being described. We fully support the principle of catchment scale management of habitats, although our experience is that for delivery the plan for improvements should be at a catchment scale but that delivery on that scale is more difficult and often needs to be undertaken as and when opportunities occur. We would also express caution about highlighting the Strahard Landscape Initiative as a demonstration, no works have yet been delivered despite the expenditure of some £100,000s The Strathard Initiative also extends beyond its catchment boundaries and mainly involves government departments and is not therefore a good example of the LLTNPA working with smaller NGOs and community groups. CP2 - We believe that INNS should be undertaken on a catchment based approach (eg Forth **Invasive Non Native Species Programme already works** on this basis), however we would suspect that managing grey squirrels on this basis would not necessarily be an obvious plan. We believe that Japanese knotweed and skunk cabbage should also be highlighted. We would be fully supportive of brown trout being a flagship species. CP5 - Again we would guery the use of wetland restoration as this should include wider freshwater bodies. We are unsure whether this priority is related to development management via planning eg stricter landscape standards for developments or not. We are unsure what landscape enhancement could take place which wouldn't deliver improvements for nature. CP6 - We would also see river banks as tranquil and also as opportunities for better networks and access through the NP, through management and core path networks. CP7 - We are very supportive of this priority and believe we could contribute to the delivery of these as a lead or in support.

Although perhaps not directly related to the LLTNPA remit, consideration could perhaps be given to closer liaison with research and education bodies who can provide evaluation and data to support the work of the NPA and its partners. The pilot Regional Land Use Partnerships both had a close relationship with either a research body or a university. This could provide added benefits and provide more robust evaluations of the work delivered.

The River Forth Fisheries Trust has a limited remit in respect of visitor experience however concurs with the outcomes as set out. VE1 - this outcome relates to recreational opportunities but the priorities all relate to paths and access there is no mention of facilities. VE2 -There are significant under used angling opportunities in the NP. We believe that there are opportunities within the plan to work in partnership with landowners, fishing rights owners and other interested bodies to develop better information portals, access and regulation. The introduction of a Protection Order which would also cover the NP would provide protection for fish species not currently covered by legislation (and not being pursued by Scottish Government on the Wild Fisheries Reform) such as brown tout (a proposed flagship species) which together with an Angling Passport could provide confidence to landowners and others on the management of anglers. This could also support the Respect Your Park and camping by-laws. We note that SportsScotland is identified as the only lead, the funding from SportScotland has limited use for some activities including angling. The Trust would welcome discussions on how it could lead on the development of angling in conjunction with other fisheries organisations including Loch Lomond Angling & Improvement Association, Argyll Fisheries Board and Trust, Tay DSFB, Scottish Federation of Coarse Anglers, Pike Alliance of Scotland etc. We confess however we don't know how we would fund this VE3 - Getting Broadband should be the top outcome and priority. Without this it is difficult to see how the other outcomes in this section and elsewhere can be achieved. VE5 whilst we fully support the premise of better access and experience for all, we are not sure if helping manage should be a priority. Visitor whilst they may enjoy the experience of a management activity (eg tree planting) should not be part of the management decision making and process as they have little long term interests into the results of that activity.

We are broadly in agreement however would make the following specific comments: VEP 10 - we are in agreement with this but the balance of these recreational activity and their interactions can be fraught and the LLTNP should consider how this is to be managed and perhaps a priority should for a code of practice to be agreed as has been agreed in other parts of Scotland eg Speyside. VEP 13 - as stated above the provision of broadband is critical to the success of information and digital visitor information. VEP 20 - the Trust has education at its heart and could support or lead on a number of outdoor learning initiatives and volunteering activities similar to those being delivered in the RiverLife: Almond & Avon project and proposed within the River Restoration project within the Callander Landscape Partnership.

John Muir Trust response to Loch Lomond & The **Trossachs National Park Partnership Plan 2018-2023** John Muir Award response The John Muir Award is the Trust's main engagement initiative. It is a nationally recognised certificate that encourages people to enjoy, connect with and care for our natural environment. Four Challenges lie at the heart of each John Muir Award -Discover a wild place, Explore it, do something to Conserve it, Share experiences. The John Muir Award contributes towards a number of different priorities across conservation & land management, visitor experience, and rural development within Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park Partnership Plan 2018-23. However, it fits most closely with Visitor Experience. A partnership between Loch **Lomond & The Trossachs National Park and the John** Muir Trust was started in 2013. The purpose of the Partnership is for the John Muir Award to become the principal environmental engagement and outdoor learning scheme promoted by Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park Authority (LLTNPA) because: • it is a flexible, practical and experienced based learning scheme that can be used by a wide range of learners, particularly equalities and inclusion groups • it encourages outdoor activity and links learners to firsthand experience of wildness and the natural environment • it will increase people's understanding of the special qualities of the Loch Lomond & The Trossachs and of John Muir (the Scottish born 'founder' of National Parks) • it is a nationally recognised scheme that is already demonstrating that it can be effective in delivering key elements of the Curriculum for Excellence Since 2013, and the beginning of partnership 5,129 people have used the John Muir Award to help connect with the National Park, experience its unique landscapes and wildlife, and take care of its special wild places. These have been achieved through local partnerships with nearly 100 partner organisations such as schools, outdoor centres, youth groups and adult learning projects. In 2015, a joint Scotland's National

Parks Conserve Audit - a monitoring exercise to identify the amount and type of activity carried out to meet the Conserve Challenge of the John Muir Award – revealed that 35,360 hours (equivalent of over 5,000 days) were dedicated to Conserve activities overall across Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park, and Cairngorms National Park, 27% of which were contributed from people experiencing disadvantage. This activity was valued at £183,002 based on Heritage Lottery Figures . In 2015 the John Muir Trust conducted a John Muir Award Provider Survey in Scotland . The aim was to assess how using the Award impacts on participants, leaders and organisations that use it. The Trust asked if using the John Muir Award contributed to participant wellbeing, specifically in relation to the Scottish Government's wellbeing indicators (SHANARRI). 88% said doing the John Muir Award helped people be more included 87% said involvement helped participants be more Active 95% said involvement in the Award helped participants to improve in Achievement In conclusion, the John Muir Trust values its current partnership with Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park. The Trust sees the John Muir Award as a principal environmental engagement and outdoor learning scheme promoted by the National Park that can help people from a wider range of backgrounds enjoy, value and help manage the National Park, as a place to realise the personal health and wellbeing benefits of connecting with nature. The John Muir Trust recognises and welcomes that it has been named as a lead delivery partner for Visitor Experience Outcome 5. John Muir Trust and UK National Park Authorities There is a strong alignment between the aims and purposes of National Park Authorities and the aims of the John Muir Trust, in approaches to both conservation and engagement. The John Muir Trust has a track record of working closely with a number of authorities over the past 14 years, managing the John Muir Award to mutual benefit. VE2 - Firstly the inclusion of the £5.5M project to restore the Maid of the Loch to commercial sailing in this Outcome is acknowledged and welcomed, as is the recognition of the importance of the existing piers to water-based recreation and tourism on the loch. Given the proposed extensive loch-wide itinerary of the "Maid" it is particularly reassuring to note that following some years of pressing for the need for such action by LLSC the improvement of the appropriate pier infrastructure is to be accorded some priority. It is clear that most piers and pontoons are in very poor condition, do not have disabled access, no public shelters, lack of branding et cetera. There are also very few places for boats to tie up alongside the various communities. In addition it is suggested that it would be beneficial if the activities "cruising" and/or "leisure" are referred to in the heart of this Visitor Experience as they are major aspects of water-based tourism in the economy of the loch and are arguably not adequately covered by the types of activity already mentioned. LLSC would also acknowledge, and agree to its inclusion as a "Support Delivery Partner" in achieving this outcome. VE3 - LLSC endorses the recognition that the quality of broadband and Wi-Fi provision throughout the Loch Lomond area is not satisfactory, - see reference to VEP 13 below. LLSC note and welcome the reference made to the Great Scottish Swim event which is actively supported by the charity. VE4 - LLSC would make a strong plea for the National Park Authority and the riparian local authorities to what together to provide a comprehensive refuge/with a collection across the whole of Loch Lomonside.

Strathard Community Council believes that the Conservation vision is ambitious and challenging but that there are important omissions in the outcomes and priorities listed. We agree with the existing 4 Conservation outcomes but we believe that there needs to be additional conservation outcomes relating to the people of the National Park. This National Park is not a 'Wilderness Park'. Its natural, environmental and cultural heritage is and has been for centuries a partnership between its people, its wildlife and its landscape. This needs to be an equal partnership. In recent years The National Park has failed to conserve some of its iconic communities such as Stronachlachar and we urge a more strategic and proactive approach to conserving and developing such communities for the long term benefit of the park as a whole. There must be a clear and unequivocal aim that no further long standing communities within the National Park are allowed to so decline under the responsibility of park management.

We fully endorse the conservation priorities listed but we feel that there are conservation principles that the National Park is currently neglecting. The Queen Elizabeth Forest Park has a wealth of heritage sites of significant archaeological importance. Appropriately managed and properly safeguarded, these sites should contribute to the diversity of visitor experience; we believe that it is unacceptable that so little significance is placed on this aspect of our heritage. There are important conservation priorities that are missing from this list. A more effective partnership with Forestry Commission Scotland is needed. Ever bigger machinery and the demand for speed and efficiencies are having a negative impact on the forest landscape. We have seen a significant increase in the Forestry Commission Scotland notifications of additional tracks within the National Park to undertake various works and harvest timber. Millions of tons of aggregates are laid down each year without formal planning approval and with little or no supervision by the National Park. They put at risk ancient pathways and sites of archaeological importance and we have seen no evidence of the landscape affected by these works being reinstated. And worse, these tracks get ever wider and with stronger foundations to accommodate the larger machinery. These additional tracks blight the landscape and undermine the National Park's conservation vision. Tighter controls and consistent supervision are needed over activities by Forestry Commission Scotland, Scottish Water and SSE in the National Park.

Conservation is not an exact science. Conflicts can arise; for example the controversial culling and sterilisation darting of the Trossachs ancient goat population and the threat to species such as the black grouse, skylarks and curlews, all native of the Trossachs but threatened by the widespread eradication of their moorland. This Community Council acknowledges that there will always be conflicting demands for conservation but we see no evidence in this Partnership Plan of the responsibility the National Park Board seeks in managing and particularly resolving these conflicts. In fact the reverse appears the norm where resolution is achieved by the more powerful of the stakeholders. The National Park should be at the heart of an open, fair and transparent conflict resolution process which engages all stakeholders whenever conservation issues clash.

Strathard Community Council has significant strengths in the areas of communication, and consultation. Every councillor lives in the National Park; we are effective "eyes & ears" for officers and the Board. We can contribute practical activity; members of our community regularly clean up notorious litter black spots and many social events encourage participation by visitors to the area. We can provide early notice of problems as well as good practice. Most importantly, we are the welcome face of the park to every visitor who comes here.

Comments:

We believe that the overarching vision for Visitor Experience contains an important omission. This is a highly diverse national park. This is what makes it different and attractive. There is no single reason that brings visitors to the area. The National Park must recognise this diversity and ensure that some areas of the park promote the tranquillity and slower pace sought by many of its visitors. Strathard is one such area where the majority of visitors come for cycling, walking, wildlife and more sedate water sports. We urge the National Park to designate Loch Ard a "quiet loch".

We support the 5 Visitor Experience outcomes but urge that the Trossachs' renowned diversity of experience is actively promoted. Archaeological heritage outcomes are also missing from this plan.

We agree with the 20 Visitor Experience priorities listed in the draft Partnership Plan but we have serious concerns about the omission of some priorities around the existing part played by our communities and their potential for even greater contribution. We have concerns that the draft Partnership Plan does not acknowledge the factors that make local and remote communities viable. With reference to Visitor **Experience Priority 11, it is commendable that** encouragement should be given to new and established "...tourism businesses to innovate and collaborate to capitalise on growth markets where appropriate to the Park's natural and cultural heritage..." However, businesses relating to tourism will only thrive in a sustainable way when communities more widely prosper. Aberfoyle, the largest community in Strathard, is currently a small town in decline. There are 8 retail or business units lying empty. There is no indication that the small industrial area on the edge of the town identified in the current Live Park Development Plan will be progressed by the National Park. There is considerable evidence from elsewhere in the UK that local economies based exclusively on tourism suffer deprivation, poor education outcomes and low selfesteem. We urge the National Park to recognise the link between a thriving tourist economy and a sustainable, resilient and year round economy supported by residents as well as visitors and incorporate this within its vision and agree a strategy to achieve this aim.

No, Comments:

Strathard Community Council does not believe this vision is achievable unless the National Park recognises the current decline of some communities within the park. Relying solely on the resilience of individual communities means those vulnerable or weaker areas will decline without proactive intervention. The National Park has recently witnessed the decline, probably beyond the tipping point, of Stronachlachar. Only once in this draft Partnership Plan is one of our communities (Aberfoyle) mentioned and yet again this is only in the context of flooding. We see nothing in this draft Partnership Plan to suggest there is a vision or a strategy for arresting the decline of some parts of Strathard. The National Park must take ownership of this decline and agree actions for rebuilding. It is not sufficient to rely on the resilience of communities to ensure their survival. Responsibility must rest with the National Park.

We agree with the 4 Rural Development outcomes. But these need to be integrated with the National Park's vision for Conservation and Visitor Experience. Residents may not always be comfortable partners with the National Park but they will always be the most important and the most effective guardians of the natural, cultural and economic heritage of our area.

Strathard Community Council supports the 19 Rural **Development priorities. Councillors have concerns** about the commitment the National Park has historically made to Strathard. Rural Development Priority 18 implies that all communities have an equal resilience and the resources to engage with their own development. We dispute this. Furthermore, this thinking endangers the future of those more vulnerable communities that cannot muster the energy or local resources to undertake such work. To date, we have seen no evidence to suggest that the National Park understands that it's many communities need very different forms of support or has different types of support to offer. Nor do we see this acknowledged in the 19 Rural Development priorities. Strathard Community Council is concerned that the National Park has not been fully committed to its stated vision for Rural Development, For example, Rural Development priority 10, relating to improved connectivity is essential for supporting small independent businesses and greater numbers of home based work. There has been little evidence of any commitment to engage with residents working for improved connectivity in Strathard. The Kinlochard Broadband Project, despite several attempts at contact, has received no support for their efforts to bring better connectivity to this small, diverse community. We urge the National Park to specify how this priority will be delivered and to devise ways of encouraging and enabling small communities to build resilience and achieve improved connectivity.

The Partnership Plan should detail "what good looks like" and ensure that planning processes support these objectives. An example of this is the recent approval given to create 8 holiday let houses in Stronachlachar at the former Scottish Water workshops. This community is already overwhelmed by tourist accommodation and there are very few permanent residents left. Similarly, there is the potential to define objectives for Aberfoyle, perhaps as a cycling hub or centre for craft workshops. The Partnership Plan should make unequivocal the determination of the National Park to reverse the process of decline and ensure that their planning guidance and practice reflects this commitment. This would give confidence to potential investors and reassurance to the community. The LLTNP Planning Department must be a proactive partner identifying clear strategies for development and particularly regeneration. This

Strathard Community Council is committed to rural development. This must be defined however, in much broader terms taking into account the wider economy and building in sustainability for the long term. The economic health of our area must not be built solely on tourism. Also, whilst it is important to achieve a demographic balance with more working age residents, we urge recognition and acknowledge of the benefits and investment brought to the area by the 'active retired'. Strathard Community Council will work with the National Park to support their efforts to undo the decline of those communities and villages that have suffered degeneration in recent years. We will continue to lobby for a planning regime that actively promotes the regeneration of struggling communities.

C1 outcome is to enhance the Park's natural resources for future generations and ensure that important habitats are restored. We support this outcome, which forms an integral part of our Land Use Management Plan. However there are potential conflicts between the various outcomes as expressed in the Plan and indeed between these and existing land uses (for example sheep farming). It is therefore important to have clear, specific and measurable outcomes to enable judgement to be made on whether these have been achieved and we believe these must be set with reference to the agreed Vision of improving ecosystems before the outcomes can be agreed. C3. We note the emphasis on considering situations where "alternative management in some upland areas could reduce the risk of downstream flooding events". This looks like a change in policy away from some traditional land uses. Whilst this may be an attractive public policy outcome in the present circumstances, care should be taken to consider the long term impact of such a change on other issues (e.g. food security/ active management of land areas rather than abandonment).

Glenfalloch's Land Use Management Plan addresses some of these priorities and more will be picked up in our next plan (currently under review). Close collaboration with the NPA, agreeing priorities and methods of delivering these is integral to the Plan's success. Specific comments as follows: CP1 Habitats both woodlands and wetlands will be more fully addressed in our revised Plan CP2 Species: we have already succeeded in extending the number and range of blackgame and red squirrel (a "flagship" species). Tackling rhododendron ponticum, Himalayan balsam (and Japanese knotweed) remain a challenge on any sort of economic basis. CP3: We suggest this is potentially the most difficult priority to reconcile with other priorities and more focused efforts will be needed to identify the Park's wildness qualities (perhaps working more closely with SNH which has undertaken some wildness survey work) and ensure they are properly evaluated and balanced with other priorities. The key elements in a successful implementation of this priority are: proper evaluation of wildness qualities (working with SNH and others); clear communication of wildness qualities and their unique importance to visitors and others; provision of acceptable alternative locations/ routes for visitors to enjoy. CP4: We suggest that the priority in any upgrade of the A82 between Tarbet and Inverarnan should be on improving the visual and safe-driving experience and should emphatically not focus on increasing speeds through this short section. The trade-off in decreased journey times through this section (only 8 miles) and visual ./ habitat impact should be carefully balanced. The Pulpit Rock section, whilst costly, is a good example of improving ease of use and visual experience without increasing speeds. Good drainage and removing the worst corners/ bottlenecks (e.g. the 7 Sisters) would do much to enhance travellers' overall experience without increasing speeds. We have facilitated and/ or undertaken a certain amount of tree clearance along sections of the railway line but there are sections where an easy "win" in terms of opening up views for passengers could be achieved and we would be ready to work with the Friends of the West Highland Railway line to achieve this. CP7: these areas are central to our new Land Use Management Plan CP10: The successful implementation of Deer Management Plans, a key element of which is effective habitat impact assessment, is a priority for Deer Management Groups. CP11: As previously mentioned the Land Use Management Plan is a crucial tool in informing our own priorities and we welcome the importance given to this by the NPA

VE 4: we do not believe that it should only be "the most popular parts of the Park" that are managed to ensure the protection and enhancement of the quality of environment visitor experience and community life. All parts of the Park are in need of this protection and whilst we accept that in absolute terms the more popular parts of the Park may see the greatest pressure (say in visitor numbers), other parts may suffer to a similar or greater degree by reference to their existing state. For example, 100 people walking on the well maintained and properly constructed WHW, will have a limited impact on the surrounding environment. the same 100 people walking up to the summit of one of the many Monroes will have a significantly greater impact. Care will be needed to avoid conflict between other interests / obligations of land managers e.g. deer management, where greater disturbance can lead to difficulties in achieving cull targets and, at certain times of year, avoiding compromising welfare through constant disturbance of deer leading to them being driven from sheltered areas and exhausting precious reserves of energy. Reconciliation of these conflicts can be achieved by careful communication, routing for visitors and measuring the overall impact of any developments in access routes. With this qualification, we do agree with the outcomes.

There are some inherent conflicts within the plan that would benefit from articulation - for instance a stated priority (1) is to support the restoration of naturally-functioning rivers but this is likely to come into conflict with Rural **Development Outcomes (7) alongside success** measures linked to the number of renewable energy schemes. The proliferation of built tracks and impediments to natural flow characteristics is a concern to the Trust in particularly sensitive sites and where it is happening at scale (individually and cumulatively). (CP3) - NTS supports the Park's ambition to conserve and enhance the qualities of wildness in the Park. It would be helpful to have more information on how this might be achieved. There are no obvious success measures associated with this objective. (CP5) - Landscape enhancements would include restructuring of commercial forestry blocks in and around wild land areas. The success measures under landscape are a poor indicator of progress. Under the carbon measure it would be preferential to monitor the overall condition of the peatland resource as opposed to only focusing on the area under restoration.

I think that supporting the wholesale development of recreational business on Loch Lomond and other lochs will destroy these lochs. It will eventually make them sterile places that are just "Landscapes" and not living natural environments. Obviously camping has to be managed on Loch Lomond, but it should not be turned into big business because this will just lead to increased pressure on the natural environment and an incessant depletion of the natural environment until Loch Lomond is just one large camping and holiday house landscape. The park is also a home to a rural community that don't want to be squeezed out of it by the continual buying up of land for holiday accommodation. I completely disagree with the use of publicly owned land that has greenbelt of ancient woodland on it. One example of this was the Forestry Commission recently selling valuable land to a housing association at a knock down price to build housing in an ancient forest, when there was a brownfield site available, which will set a poor precedent while causing an irreversible damage to ancient woodland (in the most general sense). The priorities in this section are better than the conservation priorities as they are more specific and its easier to understand what is being proposed VE1 - a review of core paths is fine so long as intention is to expand the network significantly VE2 - the Park needs to provide long-term jobs in pathwork to ensure the training provided by the Mountains and People project lead to something VE3 - projects such as this should NOT depend on the vagaries of external funding VE4integrated management of the West Highland Way is sorely needed and proper investment made in its upkeep. The Park should not meddle in trying to increase the economic benefits it brings but focus on maintaining a good experience. The lack of camping provision around Balmaha, for many the first stop off point on the Way, made worse by the byelaws is a disgrace. VE5 - this would be good if meaningful actions were planned VE6 - ditto VE7 - its unclear what this means in practice, it could be interpreted in many different ways VE8 - as a first step to this the closure of the Milarrochy slipway should be reversed VE9 welcome but needs to be affordable; this is one new transport initiative in the whole plan!! VE10 - fishing and most of the other sports are not "emerging" forms of recreation - the Plan fails to acknowledge that most of these have been adversely affected by the camping byelaws VE11 - its not the job of the Park to help private businesses capitalise on outdoor recreation VE12 there is no proper analysis of where investment needed, how much or who best placed to provide this VE13 - the priority of the NPA should be to provide information to help understanding (there is nothing on this in the Plan) rather than to help businesses VE14 - this priority is now out of date with the scrapping of permits for campervans in laybys. The rest of the camping byelaws should be scrapped too. VE15 - the agreement by the Board to look at extending the camping byelaws to the Loch Lomond islands should also be scrapped VE16 litter prevention and facilities should be a priority and meaningful actions agreed. Seeking innovative solutions for Long Long is just a recipe for delay. The local community needs ongoing funding (current funding just run out) to address the issue. VE17 - there should be no more car park charging, automated number recognition systems should be scrapped and all gates to car parks removed. These measures are simply an attempt to restrict access and should not be taking place anywhere. VE18 - is ok; the Park needs to recognise all the various sources of litter etc including park residents and stop attributing litter to one group of people VE19 - engagement should be with recreational organisations and activity providers not health partnerships VE 20 - this is so broad as to be meaningless

RD7 - the development of further renewable generation should be suspended until the impact of existing schemes has been properly evaluated. There is much evidence to show that existing schemes do not even meet the Park's own good practice guidance and they have had huge adverse impacts on the landscapes mainly due to the Park allow construction tracks to remain in place RD8 - missing words and appears meaningless RD9 - what is the evidence for this priority? RD10 - has the Park any influence over this? RD11 - 13 is this really core business for the NP? RD15 - the key is the percentage of affordable housing provision. The Park should stop approving tourist developments whether at Balmaha or Flamingo Land which fail to provide adequate housing for their workforce. There needs to be a clear plan to address the situation where much of workforce in the Park lives in caravans RD16 - 19; there is a failure to consider how communities might be assisted to take over and manage land. There are lots of fine words here but the Park's practice has belied this, failing to empower communities when it comes to the crunch (eg the housing development by the NP HQ).

There is no mention of the most important rural development challenges which is how to change landuse to benefit conservation while at same time providing better paid jobs. So, one of the big challenges in the Park is how to restructure intensive conifer forestry to provide more diverse woodland which also supports more local jobs. There are similar challenges about developing sustainable uses for hill land. The Park needs to be working with organisations like SRUC to achieve this. There is no mention of how much of the economy is based on resource extraction (wood, hydro power, sheep wool/meat) which provide very few local jobs and little financial benefit - the money flows elsewhere.

It would be difficult not to agree with the 4 conservation outcomes. I welcome the focus on landscape scale habitat restoration. However, the wording is at such a strategic level that it is hard to see what the actions on the ground will be and how they will be resourced which will lead to measurable success. The situation is not a rosy one to start with, as outlined by the list of threats facing the Park's iconic landcapes and wildlife - and you do not mention the threats from developments (actual or potential) like the gold mine. the Bodiversity plan Wild Park is excellent and has very clear priorities for habitatas and species I had expected these to be translated into the Plan. But despite it being a real action plan with projects identified it seems to have been superseded. I would like to see it refered to in terms of the auiding document for C1 & C2 outcomes. In C1 It feels to me as if the writers have not considered at all the vital link between communities (social capital) and the natural assets despite the fact that specifically on the Strathard project, the partnership of public agencies were hugely assisted by the Community Partnership with its skills of sensitivity and practical collaboration for bringing a very divided community together. This should be included as an additional measure of success and one which will be critical for sustainability. On the issue of Partnership which is very prevalent in the document I would ask that where these are set up with the inevitable string of meetings, that if the NP agree to part of the Partnership then it is critical that there is

attendance by an officer first of all, and secondly that attendence is no use at all if there is no action associated with attendance. It would be of interest to add up the cost to the public purse for all these meetings. This is particularly irksome to those who give their volunteer input to the Partnership. C2 seems to be all about nice views from motorised transport. What about cycling, walking and paddling 'opportunities to enjoy [special landscape qualities] and experience them'. Once again there is scant mention of volunteers and communities as supporting delivery. C3 is about management for climate change. Of course this is important but there are some pretty large elephants in this particular room. Clear felling, intensive grain fed cattle rearing, over grazing with sheep & deer, farm drainage, building on flood plains etc C4 is entirely about Partnerships. Exciting in theory .. love to have a reality check with examples of success in the past Plan period. Landscape Partnerships might be one but I suspect this is not the kind of partnership that is being referred to. What are Regional Landuse partnerships? My experience of the Carse of Stirling Partnership and to some extent the Strathard Initiaitive leads me to believe that getting the action/strategic balance at a 'landscape' scale is fraught with difficulties. With each of these outcomes there is lack of focus on delivery partners or even suppoprt delivery partners from the community ownership perspective or community interest in general. As mentioned above we live in changing times where young people, community interest and local businesses are taking a greater interest in what is happening in their environment. The Community Action Planning is a well established process in the National Park and was employed to good results in the Strathard Initiaitive for example.

Too many times the priority is merely supporting some other SG or public agency strategy or Plan or Scheme and all of them appear to major on collaboration of one sort or another. Very laudable but requires pinning agencies/local authorities down to delivery on more than just collaboration. Where there are clear tensions with regards to final purpose and responsibility this remains hugely confusing to the community. For example the local authority' focus on Flood Risk management (eg Aberfoyle and hard engineering solutions and drainage solutions for property protection) whereas SEPA' and SNH's focus on Natural Flood Management Schemes up in the catchment. It is not suprising therefore that young people and land managers are two of the most difficult interests to engage with. This should not be the case since we are living in a time of such change and uncertainty where new voices are being heard. New ways of farming such as with the principles of agroecology and the growing emphasis on local and regionally authentic offer the Park opportunities to set exciting new agendas.

The Community Partnership has such a tiny staff resource and a small percentage additional investment of annual resources would make a huge difference and deliver across all the NPPP outcomes.

Having led on the Skills Partnership as Vice Ch of the Community Partnership I can say that the Skills Partnership was very successful with MoA with a dozen plus agencies and organisations. Everyone was totally committed. Whilst there was funding, representatives would happily come along to a meeting and recognise how useful it was and how excellent the things which were being done were, and celebrate the MAs and new jobs which were created which without the project would not have existed. But for their organisations to take responsibility and support with long term resources... snow off a dyke. the NPA should continue to support the Community Partnership in its endeavour to develop skills, training and local job opportunities. I am sure you have noticed that Community Planning Partnerships appear at the beginning and the end of the list of Support delivery Partnerships ...! say no more! see below. RD4 There is little recognition of the changing nature of rural villages, second homes, no public transport, lack of services etc. What has the Stirling Planning Partnership ever done to 'improve how local services are provided'? My understanding is that Stirling CPP is better than the other 3 local authority equivalents! What these CPP should be resourcing alongside the NP is the Community Partnership. This organisation despite its miniscule budget has achieved real outcomes for the NP communities and for the NPA. The NPA should have a outcome which reflect this. Local authorities should match the NPA contribution so that the Community Partnership can make real successes for the communities that it represents and supports.

We are frustrated at the lack of support and understanding that the National Park has towards small rural businesses. We have never asked for any support and struggled to grow in the accommodation that we have. Trying to speak to planning regarding building office/work space has been very upsetting and not encouraging at all. We are just about to submit plans after a 7 month yo-yo to get verbal approval which may be rejected at the stage of planning consent. We use our lounge and kitchen as office space yet are told we have to demolish existing space to make room for office space built of very different materials to the existing house to gain office space. The cost to do this for a small business is extortionate with very little additional space when this plan comes to fruition. There should be approachable planners who are not rude or derogatory and could help advise small businesses instead of causing upset and costing a lot of money before getting to the planning stage. There should be an approachable advisory section that are trained in customer relations to help at the early stages. It seems to me that we are been treated very unfairly yet have no avenue to complain. All we wanted was a living/working space. Your RD2 Priority 9 - Workspace provision /rural business support would be great if it was actually put into practice. RD3 -Keeping young skilled workers in the Park makes me smile. We have verbally asked about building a low cost house for our son who is 30. He is supporting the tourism business full time yet has no place to live on his own. I am told by our agent that to apply for the affordable housing scheme is like writing a book. I am also told that once built the cost of the house if sold would be 60% of the market value. Who would want to start on this avenue. Writing that you want to encourage young adults to stay in this area is not accurate at all. We have been met with nothing but hurdles from the National Park Planning Authority and would move from the Park if it was not that we have grown a very successful business over the years that now employs many local people, trades and supports local shops and businesses by encouraging guests to visit the area.

Comments:

The following are additional points not covered by the listed questions: 1. To ensure the sustainability and resilience of communities within the National Park, these communities must be encouraged to grow and develop. There is a danger that the demographic balance of the National Park will continue to see a population aging if there is no commitment to such factors as connectivity, transport, housing, social care and employment, 2. Rural Development priorities 11 & 12 relating to education are laudable but they will not be achieved without active measures to encourage small businesses to this area. Education alone will not create employment. Also, it is not sufficient nor would we want our local economy to be solely reliant on tourism. A thriving economy is based on diversity. The National Park must revisit its Development Plan and devise and follow a strategy to attract small businesses to Strathard. 3. Strathard is a relatively remote area of the National Park. Public sector accommodation is available in Aberfoyle and a National Park 'outpost' base would provide a valuable presence in this community and make efficiencies for the upgraded ranger service needed for the Camping Management Zone in this area. Above all, it would make a powerful statement of commitment to this vulnerable community. 4. We support Rural Development outcome 3: "Population decline is being addressed by attracting and retaining more skilled working age and young people within the National Park". However, this Partnership Plan ignores the growing older population living in the park. They are a part of our heritage and we note that none of the priorities and no part of the vision explores how the National Park can support this section of our population, meet their changing needs and ensure that they can remain in their homes with the dignity and appropriate levels of care they deserve. 5. Finally, the impression given by the vision statements and their associated priorities and outcomes in this draft partnership plan is that residents are only valued for the contribution they make to the tourist economy. We reject this. We do not accept that ours is a "wilderness park". If the National Park is to sustain the true heritage of this landscape it must acknowledge the contribution local people make to the area: its environment, wildlife, culture and overall economy. This is the real partnership of the Trossachs.

➤ We believe the draft plan lacks a coherent vision for the upland landscape of the Park. ➤ Based on our experience of hydro schemes to date, there is a need for a step change improvement in how the PA planning team applies itself to the approval, restoration and mitigation of tracks for hydro schemes which clearly fail to meet appropriate environmental standards. We cite the Glen Falloch scheme as a prime example of environmental degradation caused by a hydro scheme approved by the planning authority.

> Outcome 1: There is clearly a tension between the drive by the Scottish Government for increased timber production and the need to restore landscape scale forests following harvesting and increase the planting of non-native species. The PA has a great opportunity to restore and improve such habitats by influencing forest plans and ensuring where possible that native species and forest design are used beneficially to enhance the landscape and move away from Sitka plantations. In this context, we believe the PA has failed to uphold the protection of oak woodlands already and we therefore have little confidence that the PA can achieve this outcome. > Outcome 2: We are increasingly concerned that the PA use euphemistic language when talking about conserving and enhancing the landscape in the context of providing more opportunities for people to enjoy and explore them. If this means more rules, restrictions on access, more byelaws and more ridiculously high parking charges (e.g. such as at Luss) which penalise someone who wants to enjoy a day's hillwalking, then the impact on visitors will be negative. > Outcome 3: This lacks any credible detail. > Outcome 4: The creation of Regional Land Use Partnerships might meet the Scottish government's objective but we would question, based on present experience, the extent to which recreational and environmental interests will be represented and their views considered as communities of interest. ➤ Priority 6: We remain fundamentally opposed to the camping management byelaws and have requested at the Stakeholder Forum that the PA ensure that recreational interests are permitted an opportunity to comment as part of the annual review process and reporting to Ministers. > Priority 10: The PA should ensure that deer management plans include in their scope the consideration of the effectiveness of current arrangements for responsible access and improvements where necessary.

>Outcome VE1. The statement concerning a review of core paths mentions 'fit for purpose'. We would like to understand what the aims of the review mean for the current network of core paths and whether the PA has any plans to reduce the core path network. > Outcome VE3. We recognise the importance of a robust local economy but this seems to be an over-riding objective of the PA in comparison with its environmental and conservation priorities. In a related context, there is an urgent need for greater expansion of publicly and privately-owned toilet, rubbish collection and campsite facilities within the Park, which remain inadequate to meet demand. > Outcome VE4. We question the ability of the PA to act effectively in exercising 'management' of popular areas of the Park. We cite the debacle over byelaws which we learn after 4 months are not now applicable to campervans and motor homes, the fact that the suitability of camping spaces provided under the new permit system has been disappointingly inadequate and the PA's inability to use what was effective legislation prior to the imposition of byelaws. This does little to suggest the experience of visitors would be enhanced by further measures taken by the PA. ➤ Outcome VE5. The online permit booking system does not encourage visitors from all backgrounds as it relies on access to the internet and a bank account. In this regard, it is divisive and disproportionately off putting to low income visitors. Paradoxically, low income visitors are perhaps one of the more important groups to encourage into the Park (to realise the personal health and wellbeing benefits) as opposed to other, middle class, middle income visitors who come regardless.

We have stated or continued objection to the imposition of camping management byelaws above. What is still lacking is the adequate provision of toileting and litter collection provision at sensitive sites throughout the Park. The PA should develop a plan which specifically addresses these issues as a matter of priority otherwise the aim of a 'reduction in litter levels' will not be achieved. > Visitor Experience Priority 17. We identify above the example of totally inappropriate car parking charges at Luss. The PA needs to ensure that traffic management measures such as parking charges are proportionate. Charges should not exclude people who want to use toilet facilities for a short time or park all day for a hill walk or similar activity. If this is not addressed the PA will exclude individuals and fail to meet Visitor Experience Outcome VE5.

The measures of this section do not reflect the objectives -for example the Land Management measure does not reflect the Priority. The Loch Lomond & Trossachs Country side Trust is not a lead delivery partner - LLTNP has the responsibility. KCC would like to see a funding plan for any activity that is out with the LLTNP current role. C3 Climate change, Priority 3 & 4 KCC consider the Priorities 3 and 4 to be conflicting with the objective. Dark skies enhancement is not related to climate change in this context. We support a dark skies policy where is has relevance to technical planning. KCC support improved public/community transport networks that link together to provide for visitors and residents to reduce dependence on private cars. KCC support the lead organisation for Roads should be the appropriate Government department and LLTNP should enforce its aims accordingly. Developments such as Flamingo land will contradict this objective. C7 Priority 7 and 8 Flood management and water management KCC support the lead organisation for Water management being SEPA and the LLTNP should enforce its own aims accordingly. SEPA is resourced and has regulatory powers to achieve these Priorities at present. KCC would support more defined scientific benchmarks. The Measures given are not sufficient nor are they definitive measures. C1 Conservation outcome Over-fishing of the Clyde, Loch Long and mouth of the Holy Loch results in severely reduced fish stocks. More support and action should be taken to reduce the amount of commercial fishing in the area. Kilmun, Strone and Blairmore rely quite heavily on holiday makers/leisure fishers. The lack of fish herein directly impacts on the attraction to our area. There is a big issue with feral cats in our area. Cats dramatically reduce the amount of red squirrels that feed on supplies left by householders. Within the area in which we live, 2 nearby residents have cats that hide at the foot of the squirrel feeders. We have seen the number of squirrels reduce from 8 per day to one occasionally, due to the addition of a new cat to the area. The point is, unless more is done to reduce the amount of un-neutered cats, the amount of feral cats will increase dramatically. There are native wildcats in our area, which have been viewed less and less. C2 The document refers to the quality of the wilderness and dark skies. In Kilmun for example, there are numerous street lights that remain on throughout the night. Liaison with the local Council could allow the trial of some of the lights to be turned off at night in order to improve the dark sky on the area. Long term tests on the M25 some years ago revealed that turning off lights on permanently lit areas of the motorway did not increase collisions or impede driver safety. Many of the lights in the area could be turned off in a trial, to establish how this impacts on the dark skies, and this would also reduce costs for the local Council, potentially releasing funds for important issues in the area. C4 This section discusses biodiversity and good ecological condition of the water. As all agencies are aware, there is a large amount of sewage that is allowed to be pumped out to our Lochs due to outdated or non-existent sewage treatment systems. I note many properties that discharge out to sea, that renew their discharge pipes. Whilst it is a positive step for that householder, properties that discharge to sea, and there is no public system in place, should be supported (financially if appropriate) in fitting systems to their properties that allows only 'grey water' to be discharged to sea. Unless Agencies liaise and take positive action, the rate of sewage discharge to sea will not reduce, and any targets to improve upon the ecological condition of the water in such areas will be impossible to achieve.

VE1 Visitor experience outcome We have many visitors to our Shore areas. We also have many areas of outstanding beauty. However, most of those are inaccessible. The provision of areas in which to park vehicles, cleared paths and tidying of areas would provide much needed access to the many visitors to our area, thus benefitting the local community and helping to achieve more recreational sites for visitors. It should be noted that within the document, no mention of our area has been made whatsoever...i.e. Cowal including Clachaig, Rashfield, Kilmun, Strone or Blairmore. We have much to offer, and areas that are in need of improvements, but Parks seem to focus on their 'sponsored areas' such as Loch Lomond and areas immediately surrounding. VE2 Once again, reference within this section is to the areas around Loch Lomond and other areas obviously favoured by Parks. Our area seems to be completely forgotten, and Parks should be reminded that we are also with the area of Loch Lomond & the Trossachs National Park! VE3 This section discusses how to improve the visitor experience. overnight stays and visitor spend. As previously discussed, leisure fishing was a massive part of the local economy, due to the large amount of people that used to visit and stay in our area in order to enjoy that sport. The lack/disappearance of popular fish to our Lochs have curtailed such business. Urgent action needs to be taken in order to redress this issue, and as we are within the Park, LL&TNP should be at the forefront in such action. I refer again to VE1 comments that would also impact positively in VE3. VE4 This section discusses the quality of the environment. Like many areas in Scotland, we suffer with a litter problem. However, how can we improve this when there is a general lack of litter bins in the area, and concerns from the local Council that they would not be able to collect from additional litter bins. Quite simply, if we wish to encourage visitors (and local people) to dispose of their litter (including dog litter) responsibly, we need to increase the amount of litter bins in the area...and the frequency of collection of such. This is an area where Parks could and should be proactive on our behalf. VE5 This outcome seeks to allow people from a wider area and range of backgrounds to enjoy, value and assist in managing the National Park, claiming it is used more as a place for people to realise the personal health and well-being benefits of connecting with nature. If Parks continue to ignore our area, such growth and expectations cannot and will not be achieved in our area. By the provision of amenities such as toilets etc, access to hills, trails and other areas of interest in our area, by providing parking areas as previously discussed, we could help Parks to fulfil this objective and improve our area considerably. There is not one public toilet within our Shore. The nearest public toilet is in Ardentinny!

Whilst I don't know what the end of life use is for that wood, surely we could benefit far more if we had a business in the area that could process the wood into its 'end of life' outcome? Could Parks liaise with other agencies to set up or encourage a processing plant that could make use of the wood, thus reducing the cost of transportation and negative impact to our environment ? We have no manufacturing industries in the area. A positive move from Parks and other Agencies in this would really strengthen the local economy, provide employment and reduce pollution. We know that sense of place and the quality of the natural environment are important parts of the boating experience for many boaters. We welcome the commitment to educating visitors around appropriate behaviours and hope this can lead to the reduction of the use of bye laws to manage negative impacts. Education not legislation is a foundation principle for the RYA across the UK. We note the intention to create Land Use Partnerships and would advocate for inclusion of stakeholders with a clear interest in access to the water for recreational purposes.

In Priority 2 (and presumably in Priority 5), the examples of invasive non-native species given are terrestrial. Consideration must be given to the risks around the introduction of aquatic species. Factors affecting the development of blue green algae including warmer temperatures should also be considered. We note and welcome the reference to tranquillity throughout the priorities in Conservation Outcome 2 as tranquil loch shores are important for many boaters. However, a balance will need to be struck with motorised activities that have an unavoidable degree of noise and are a substantial element of the attraction for boating on the parks lochs and waterways. As noted above, Priority 9 should also include collaboration with stakeholders representing communities of interest and we would advise the inclusion of the Clyde Marine Planning Partnership as there is a statutory requirement to coordinate marine and terrestrial planning.

In Priority 7 it is important to recognise the diversity of water craft and their different requirements. Powered craft are part of the heritage of boating on Loch Lomond. We feel that possible routes for small craft sailing/camping trips, including sailing/paddling canoes should be investigated and promoted on all appropriate lochs. Such craft will be unpowered or have only a low powered auxiliary outboard engine. Similarly there is scope for investigating and promoting possible routes for stand-up paddleboard tours, using car-accessible small campsites or permit-camping locations.

Visitor Experience Outcome 2 and in particular Priority 8 fail to address improving access to the water. This is a significant omission in the plan. The recent closure of the slip way at Milarrochy Bay is an example where access is becoming more restricted. We are ardent that the slipways and launching sites, particularly for small low powered or unpowered craft should be a fundamental part of the priorities around the visitor experience facilities in this outcome. Piers, pontoons and moorings only represent improved facilities for those already on the water and are arguably only of interest to larger vessels. A focus on these facilities fails to acknowledge the value of the small boat community that is active on and around the lochs of the park and risks becoming exclusive. More points of access will help dissipate the pressure on the existing facilities, extend the opportunities to visit other areas of the park and improve the overall visitor experience. Where these can be in less busy parts of the park, we do not see a need for staffing these. We feel it would be beneficial for Visitor Experience Priority 10 to note that actions are required to ensure activities can take place in harmony with each other. It should be recognised in Visitor Experience Priority 12 that while attracting events can be very beneficial for the local economy, coordination is needed to ensure that this is not at the expense of existing activities, or indeed the conservation objectives. Under Visitor Experience Priority 14, RYA Scotland reluctantly recognises the need to suspend the right to responsible camping in some areas of the National Park but hopes that this will be a temporary measure so that responsible rights of access can be enjoyed. We feel that the park should promote and uphold rights of responsible access as the Outdoor Access Code gives clear guidance about what is considered unacceptable behaviour by visitors and landowners as well as remedies in the case of behaviour that is not considered responsible. In this context, where camping management byelaws override the Scottish Outdoor Access Code, the National Park should consider reducing the extent of the managed/banned zones if control of problem camping is achieved by the end of the review period. This is particularly important and achievable away from roadaccessed areas. As a key principle of the RYA is 'education not legislation', we particularly welcome VEP 18. Sometimes inappropriate behaviour is simply due to ignorance particularly as there is no requirement for training before venturing into the outdoors either into the mountains or onto the water.

RYA Scotland is able to provide expert advice and information on many aspects of the wide range of types of recreational boating under power, sail, and paddle. We have already offered to help with the development of those parts of the National Park website relating to water-borne activities.

We would emphasise that the draft plan does not consider the value of communities of interest and makes an inherent assumption that only the immediate geographic community is either a driver or beneficiary of rural development. We would note that there are significant communities of interest engaged in and around the National Park with and through whom rural development can be enhanced. We would add the observation that key stakeholders in an area of interest are not necessarily those people who live nearest to it. Rural Development Outcome 2 and in particular Priority 8 fail to include businesses that are not land based. This is a significant omission in the plan. We suggest that the wording be changed to reflect support to all rural businesses. This we believe will be more inclusive and incorporate those businesses who operate on and around the aquatic environment, including water-ski centres, sailing centres, river kayak guiding and training, water based tour companies and more.

On the whole Scottish Land & Estates agrees with the four conservation outcomes although there are small changes we would like to see made to C1 and C4 as follows - C1: The Parks natural resources are maintained & enhanced for future generations: important habitats are maintained & restored and better connected on a landscape scale. We would like to see the word 'maintained' inserted to recognise that not all sites are in poor condition and in need of enhancement. C4: New catchment-scale partnerships deliver better integrated management of land and water environment, where possible providing multiple benefits for people and nature. Multiple benefits won't be possible from every piece of land, and the change we suggest reflects this. A framework which allows good and relevant choices to be made about land use and management also needs to be developed, such as the suggested Regional Land Use Partnerships advocated in the Land Use Strategy. Outcomes: Aside from the changes suggested above, our only other comment related to outcomes is that on Page 11, under the section -"Achieving these outcomes will help to deliver the following national strategies", you have included the Climate Change Act as a strategy. The Act itself is not a strategy. The Scottish Government's latest Climate Change Strategy is set out in RPP3 (The Climate Change Plan), so this bullet point simply needs amended to reflect this.

While on the whole we are in agreement that the priority areas identified are indeed priorities and we would not suggest the headings change, we do have some specific comments to make on the priorities and we have included these in our response to the question below. Priorities: Conservation Priority 2 – species • Point 1..."Tackling and reducing the impacts of invasive and non-native species.... in a strategic, water-catchment based approach. Is there any particular reason a watercatchment based approach is being taken here or is it a proxy for landscape scale? It makes sense for some INNS to be tackled by water catchment but not all. Conservation Priority 3 • The Park Authority will work to conserve and enhance qualities of wildness.... Scottish Land & Estates has always had concerns with the use of terms such as "wild land", and the concepts of qualities of wildness. There is almost nowhere in Scotland which has been shaped only by nature and might therefore be considered wild or wilderness. Scotland has some beautiful, valued landscapes but shaping by human development is an integral part of what they are. If we are to have a living, working countryside, humans will need to be allowed to continue to shape it. Of course, there are some places that need sensitive treatment and there are some aspects of our past that we should be careful not to obliterate from our landscapes, but we are concerned that there is a movement which wishes to pretend we are preserving wildness. We would be happy to discuss this point more fully with Authority staff. Conservation Priority 10 • "..... This will be done through the development of Deer Management Plans and associated Habitat Impact Assessments...." Is the intention for the Park to develop its own deer management plan? And/Or will the Park be working in collaboration with Deer Management Groups? Scottish Land & Estates believes there is an opportunity for LLTNP to adopt an integrated and coordinated approach to managing the deer herd and would like to see deer management undertaken in direct collaboration and coordination with Deer Management Groups, supporting and enhancing current deer management effort. Scottish Land & Estates is supportive of the suggestion that deer management could expand and focus on landscapescale delivery, delivering landscape-scale conservation management and ecosystem services (carbon storage, water quality management, woodland/riparian restoration) - an approach which has been adopted by some Deer Management Groups (e.g. Monadhliaths DMG) out with the LLTNP.

Yes, Scottish Land & Estates agrees and is supportive of the overarching visitor experience vision. Rural estates are a mainstay of rural economies in Scotland and tourism plays a key role in the economy of the Park. We therefore welcome the high priority given to visitor experience within the draft partnership plan and we broadly agree with the aspirations contained within the vision. Members feel the existing infrastructure in the Park is need of attention and support. Toilet, bin and parking provision is believed to be poor and irresponsible parking is causing access issues for some members. Members are happy to work with the Park to create a solution, but there is some apprehension about how supportive Park planners would be.

We are generally supportive of the Visitor Experience (VE) outcomes. Scottish Land & Estates believes that VE4 is a key issue and should be given greater importance. One example of an issue that affects this outcome is that there are currently 3 different groups managing Park bins (LLTNPA, Bear Scotland and local authorities) which causes unnecessary difficulties – there needs to be a joined up approach. We feel private land managers should be support delivery partners.

Scottish Land & Estates is in broad agreement with the priorities as set out in the draft partnership plan. We have made comment in further detail below. Scottish Land & Estates would like to see included within the 'how success measured' - publically available/accessible facilities. It is harder to measure usage but acknowledges private contribution/opportunity. It is key that private land managers are considered support delivery partners for Visitor Experience Outcome 3. Our members within the Park feel that Priorities 16 and 17 are the most important. We recognise that the priorities are not meant to be in order of importance but we believe these to be key to the success of the overall delivery. A lack of bins and parking facilities have been highlighted as significant problems. Members have identified tourists parking irresponsibly has caused problems for normal business operation such as larger vehicles turning. In terms of priority 10, our members would like to see water activities being policed more actively by the Park Authority. We appreciate that rangers cover a large area but members believe the current boat cover on Loch Lomond is not enough.

Q18 Are there any areas that you think are important and that are not covered by the priorities?

It is worth noting that for some of our members in the Park there is a clear conflict between conservation and visitors. Issues such as dogs off leads affecting nesting birds, or access to the protected Loch Lomond islands are not being managed and have led to visitors being considered "the biggest conservation threat". There is also concern that land managers are expected to do the clearing up after visitors have left which leads to frustrations. Members are concerned with reputational damage last summer due to lack of toilets. Given that composting loos have been working at the Linn of Dee near Braemar, we would like to see consideration given to introducing such facilities in Loch Lomond & the **Trossachs National Park. Scottish Land & Estates** considers Loch Lubnaig Cabin as an outstanding example of successful visitor management and partnership working. Tourism may be the low-hanging fruit in terms of opportunity for development within the Park, but it is vital that any scheme is well planned, taking into account a range of competing priorities.

We welcome priority 3 and urge that it includes the renovation and conversion of vernacular buildings in more rural areas. Priorities 6 and 7 are very similar. We question how renewable energy generation will be encouraged when funding levels are dropping. Priority 10, improved broadband and mobile coverage, is of fundamental importance to achieving many of the other priorities and although the priorities are not ranked members would like to see this priority given greater emphasis. We welcome priority 14, to continue investment in affordable housing provision, identification of new delivery models and support to communities and landowners to provide affordable selfbuild and private rent options. Interest in the Rural Housing Fund has been lower than hoped and there is an opportunity to promote this further. Innovative delivery is key to overcoming excessive costs of rural development. The use of cross subsidised development and rural housing burdens should be considered. We are pleased the draft plan identifies infrastructure costs as a challenge but we are uncertain as to how these will be overcome. We would welcome the support of the existing provision of affordable housing. There is a risk that while focusing on new development the existing supply reduces due to pressures of new legislation. While we believe priority 18 is an important one, we believe a community does not need, and in many cases, does not want, to own an asset. There are numerous examples of shared ownership and long leases between our members and the wider community which work successfully. Success should not be measured by the number of community owned assets but the success of assets with community involvement.

Conservation Outcome C3 - this outcome discusses adaptation and mitigation of climate change effects in the context of the natural environment only. 2. Promotion of the West Highland Way for cyclists. For the second time. last week we had a cyclist 'off the radar' who had selected to cycle part of the West Highland Way and having carried their bike for a number of miles had chosen to leave the route at Inversnaid and find an alternative road route. Last week's cyclist was looking to get back to the A82 (!), the last one was looking for Crianlarich (!). The decision to leave the route at Inversnaid is hampered of course by a lack of mobile coverage so they can then not access apps to guide them out of the area. Perhaps someone needs to look at the marketing of the whole route as to its suitability for cyclists. 3. Black Grouse. There is an area at the head of Loch Arklet which is strimmed to encourage the local Black Grouse population. This is within sight of the B829 yet most visitors remain unaware of their presence at the appropriate time of year. Many visitors are so pleased when they see deer, red squirrels, badgers, pine martens and the like....it's what they came to Scotland for, all that wildlife, yet so far little is done to promote viewing of the Black Grouse in our area. Visitors seem to have the misconception that sighting a Black Grouse is akin to spotting Nessie! A decent lay-by and an information board is all it would take...not everyone walks along the footpath behind, which was closed for many months, to see the board placed there.

Comments:

1. The first is mobile coverage of rural areas but specifically the B829 road from Aberfoyle to Stronachlachar and the Great Trossachs Path section along the North Shore road round Loch Katrine. We've lost count of the number of vehicles we've pulled out of the ditch on the B829 who more often than not are in a bit of a quandary as having got stuck they can then not use a mobile phone to get assistance and are at the mercy of waiting for a passing vehicle. With the new camp site facility at Loch Chon I would have thought it prudent for the National Park to push for urgent coverage. There seems to be a regular presence of rangers throughout the day at the camp site but once they leave, again any problems are reliant on local help. An improvement in the road by Stirling Council both in quality of surface and the presence of better and more frequent passing places would go a long way to reduce the number of adverse comments from visitors which again must improve the whole visitor experience. In the three years we've been using the road there has been a marked increase in the number of camper vans using the route which is already used by luxury coaches. There are a number of sections of the Great Trossachs Path which are in areas of no mobile coverage whatsoever. In the event of an emergency on the Loch Katrine North Shore road cyclists (and walkers too of course) have to seek help from residents with landlines. We are at the western end of a stretch of six miles of road, including the notorious 'graveyard hill' and only last month an accident victim with multiple injuries had to wait for passing walkers to arrive to stay with the victim whilst another person sought a phone line. Unfortunately we were out and connection was eventually made through a satellite broadband connection at one of the holiday cottages in Glengyle. If the route is being actively promoted surely the National Park have a duty to ensure that route safety is adequate for any eventuality? There is a safety aspect to the lack of mobile coverage. A number of walkers of the route are women and we have had callers asking to camp on our property for safety reasons. Basically they wish to be within sight of a property with a phone. On Loch Katrine these are few and far between. Two young German girls had agreed to call their parents every evening to touch base, not realising when they left home that much of where they were walking and camping didn't have mobile coverage which had caused unnecessary anguish. Their solution was to agree to camp always in a safe environment, close to habitation.

We welcome the intention of Priority 9, the creation of a Regional Land Use Partnership. We would find it useful to explore how a more spatial Land-use Plan could be created for the Park. This could enable a more strategic delivery of many of the outcomes outlined within the Plan. We welcome the support for Deer Management Groups, Priority 10. In our view the functionality of these Groups is key to their success, rather than coverage. Therefore, in assessing, the success of Deer Management Groups within the Park, the data within Deer Management in Scotland: Report to the Scottish Government from Scottish Natural Heritage 2016 and any further reviews would be a good starting point. The biodiversity section is comprehensive, though reference to contributing to the national ecological network would be useful. The landscape section focuses on development and a supporting reference to either the **European Landscape Convention or the Scottish** Landscape charter would also be useful. Would the infrastructure improvements to the A82 / A83 under Conservation Outcome 2 be better placed under rural development or visitor experience, whilst taking account of landscape issues? We would be grateful for the acknowledgement of SNH's contribution to the Ecosystem's Services Strathard Project to be included on page 16.

We would welcome greater ambition in delivering the Scottish Government's health and wellbeing agenda. Our view is that the Park could play a stronger role in engaging with Health Partnerships to explore how the Park can be used as a resource to support health improvement initiatives (VE Priority 19). Priorities specifically seeking Health outcomes have a low profile (mentioned as part of Visitor Experience – Outcome 5 – which talks about increased use of the Park to realise health benefits) and the opportunity to address health issues by targeting specific health needs doesn't appear to be followed up in VE Priority 19. There is limited coverage of 'outreach' work and promoting use of the Park by target communities in neighbouring urban centres. We would welcome a more proactive approach in seeking out health sector partners and developing nature-based health promotion initiatives and interventions. We would be happy to advise on, for example, establishing a local Green Health Partnership with West Dunbartonshire and Glasgow City Councils. We would also like to offer our continued support in the delivery of the Your Park visitor management strategy and would like to take this opportunity to reiterate the importance of a continued commitment to positive investment in camping provision not just regulation. We would welcome a continued commitment to develop further camping provision over the coming years. We recognise the resources required to establish the visitor management strategy in this, the first year, and that your focus has been on the successful implementation of the byelaws and the permitting scheme. However we would like to reiterate our view that long term behavioural change requires a continued commitment to positive investment in camping provision, i.e positive provision not just regulation. There is an opportunity of the Park be an exemplar destination in terms of sustainable tourism, and support /encourage as many businesses as possible to be part of the Green Tourism Business Scheme. This would make the most of the green credentials of Park tourism providers. Nature based tourism is worth £1.4 billion and incorporates wildlife watching, walking and adventure activities, touring to enjoy Scotland's landscapes, and country sports including shooting, hunting and fishing.

We understand that this is a strategic document and that it would not necessarily be appropriate to include the proposed mechanisms for delivery here, however it would be useful to incorporate active links throughout the document which led to the more operational reports which sit underneath. Whilst it is recognised that this is a high level document, it would be useful to provide links to supporting documents which might provide the detail for delivery, such as links to the LDP and community action plans. The plan would also benefit from greater emphasis on community empowerment and community development and more explicit reference to development policy. Although there is reference to depopulation and an aging demographic, there is little reference to areas of greatest need, such as the Cowal peninsula. It would be welcomed if this area could be highlighted as an area of focus, and greater emphasis made of promoting this more underutilised area. It would also be welcomed if Dunoon and Helensburgh could be specifically mentioned in order to highlight these towns as gateway routes into the park. As we are keen to promote the long distance routes of 3 Lochs Way and John Muir Way, it would also be welcomed if these could be mentioned in addition to the West Highland Way.

We agree with the vision as described but conservation of natural heritage is the primary purpose of the National Park and therefore to show this commitment, albeit in a subtle way, perhaps changing the vision to read "...managed and enhanced to provide multiple benefits for nature and people' would be a good indication of this. We agree with the four outcomes apart from C4. which refers to new catchment scale partnerships. By using the term catchment, which is a technical one (and not defined in the glossary) this is restrictive and assumes only partnerships at this scale are supported. Catchment scale also covers many different scales from a single burn to an entire loch. A better term would be landscape-scale as this links to early references of this in the document for example on pages 6 and 7. It is widely recognised that we should be taking a landscape scale approach to nature conservation, to help reverse the decline of our most threatened species and to deliver climate change adaptation and increase resilience. On page 11 under significant threats the Park faces, there is reference to unsustainable levels of grazing animals leading to reduced tree cover and erosion of soils. Impacts on protected areas and biodiversity should also be referred to here Conservation Outcome C1 Within the text which describes 'why is this outcome important' for C1 it states that 21% of the Park is designated for its special nature conservation value and on page 11 it states these are across 67 sites. It would be useful to indicate what proportion of designated features are currently in favourable conservation status and 'under the measures for success by 2023', there should be specific targets to achieve a certain proportion of designated features with favourable condition. It could be argued there should be a separate Conservation Priority for designated sites because it should be a clear priority that we are all striving to ensure these very best examples of our priority habitats and special species are in the best condition they can be in. These areas act as an important framework for wider conservation effort throughout the Park, as they are critical to the bigger, better and more connected concept for species and habitat protection and enhancement.

Q10 Do you agree with the 11 Conservation priorities?

Do you have any specific comments on the priorities?:

Conservation Priority 1 – Habitats, the description of what work will be supported with regard to woodlands is very narrow "to target areas of sparse woodland cover and help restore native upland woodland and scrub habitats, particularly along hillside burns, and also waterside woodlands on the banks of rivers, burns and lochs in the glens of the Park". We suggest the priority should be to produce a woodland strategy that identifies what types of woodland would be appropriate in which location, highlight the woodland types that the Park is particularly important for such as Atlantic woodland, to indicate where more connected habitat networks could be created (helping deliver the Woodland Habitat Networks Wild Challenge). This would have significant multiple benefits of improving wider biodiversity,

priority species and napitats and landscapes, it would offer more access, flood management and carbon capture opportunities. Another part of this priority should be to also focus better management on existing woodlands. The partners then have all the information they need to ensure delivery can happen in a more prioritised and targeted way. Conservation Priority 2 -Species, first point refers to invasive non-native species (INNS), given the conservation impacts these have on our native wildlife and have a high resource requirement to deal with this issue, we suggest it should be a separate conservation priority. In some but not all cases it is appropriate to take a water-catchment based approach. Some INNS plants move via watercourses and water bodies however grev squirrels and Rhododendron ponticum do not. In these instances the approach may be better described as "an appropriate landscape scale approach". The priorities under this conservation priority need to be better identified such as the range of INNS species being worked on and the mechanisms for this. Also under Conservation Priority 2, gannet is listed as a marine flagship species. Gannets are not a WildPark 2020 action species and can only occasionally be spotted off shore foraging. A better marine flagship species could come from the Upper Loch Fyne and Loch Goil MPA features, for example ocean quahog. They are one on the worlds most long lived animals and as they are slow growing it takes a long time for their populations to recover. This is also an RSPB Scotland priority species for engagement purposes. Alternatively, oystercatchers and other wading birds could be used as a flagship species because loch shores can be important foraging areas, particularly in the winter. We do not agree that Conservation Priority 4 should be within the Conservation section. This refers to enhancing opportunities for visitors to enjoy landscapes particularly along major roads and highlights the A82 upgrade as a priority. Improving road networks would be an inappropriate priority under conservation and detracts from the other conservation priorities, it would fit better under visitor experience or rural development. The Great Trossachs Forest (TGTF) should not be considered as a Support Delivery Partner because the three landowning bodies are the deliverers on the ground. These have already been listed. With reference to our earlier comment about what makes a lead delivery partner and a support delivery partner an example of this is Deer Management Groups (DMG) as a Lead partner. DMGs are made up of SNH and landowners and therefore these are the delivery partners. Conservation Outcome C2 Conservation Priority 5 refers to 'Landscape enhancements that also deliver improvements for nature such as woodland creation, wetland restoration or tackling invasive nonnative species'. TGTF is a prime example of this but the primary driving force was from the perspective that woodland creation was for the benefit of priority species and habitats with the result that the landscape was enhanced. As the primary aim of the National Park is to conserve and enhance the natural and cultural heritage of the Park then the wording of the priority should be switched around to 'improvements for nature such as...has the benefit of providing landscape enhancement'. Conservation Priority 6 refers to 'Safeguarding and restoring tranquil loch shores

through Your Park and Respect Your Park Initiatives'. We suggest this better sits under the visitor experience section as both these initiatives relate to people management and education, perhaps under Outcome VE4 'The most popular parts of the National Park which experience pressures are managed to ensure that the quality of environment, visitor experience and community life are protected and enhanced'. The lists of partners under C2 do not reflect the breadth of partners required to deliver Conservation Priority 5. All land managers in the Park have a role in delivering this priority. Conservation Outcome C3 Under Conservation Priority 7, woodland creation should be added to woodland enhancement as this is an obvious way to build resilience and mitigate climate change impacts. **Conservation Outcome C4 Please refer to earlier** comment regarding wording of C4. Conservation Priority 9 – we welcome inclusion of reference to land use partnerships. However, it is not evident from the text what their remit would be and whether land use plans will be prepared and delivered or will they be made responsible for elements of the Plan. We also suggest changing the scale at which they operate from catchment scale to 'appropriate' scale. For example, a land use partnership for the whole Loch Lomond catchment would be very large and may be perceived by some landowners as not focussed or relevant. Alternatively, a single landowner may fall under several smaller catchments, so could end up on several groups, which would be untenable. Conservation Priority 10 refers to support for DMGs in the Park through the development of Deer Management Plans (DMPs) and associated Habitat Impact Assessments. There are parts of the Park where DMGs do not exist, will the Park facilitate these more widely or develop other mechanisms such as land use partnerships or landowner forums to fulfil this role. The development of DMPs are a useful starting point but if the plans are not fully implemented with adequate monitoring, then adverse impacts from high grazing levels will continue. We would wish to see a stronger commitment under this conservation priority from the NPA to work with SNH to use the full suite of statutory and other mechanisms available to ensure the DMPs are delivered. In addition. part of the Park suffers from over-grazing by feral goats, which are damaging several SSSI's. The Park could play a very important role in facilitating a way forward with the landowners across the feral goat range and SNH, to strategically deal with this growing issue. Therefore, this conservation priority should incorporate wider strategic herbivore management rather than just deer, making it more representative of the conservation needs of the Park.

Visitor **Experience Outcome 5 We feel we can significantly** contribute to this outcome with over 2,000 hours by volunteers alone being spent at Loch Lomond Reserve in 2016/17; our unique offer of residential volunteering both long-term and short-term at the reserve, aims to develop peoples skills for future employment. We offer a wide variety of events and opportunities for visitors and members of the local communities to engage and connect with nature. Priority 14 (camping management): Loch Lomond Sailing Club feels that the park should promote and uphold rights of responsible access under the Scottish Outdoor Access Code as it gives clear guidance about what is considered responsible behaviour by visitors in camping and in the use of fires. Where the new camping management byelaws now override the Scottish Outdoor Access Code, the National Park should consider reducing the extent of the managed/banned zones as soon as control of problem camping is achieved - by the end of the first review period, if possible. Priority 15 (Loch Lomond islands): Loch Lomond Sailing Club observes that visitor pressures on the islands arise more heavily from day-visiting boats than from overnight anchoring or camping boats. Any measures to control these pressures need to be focussed on 'education not legislation' to mitigate the pressures of toileting, fires and camping rather than trying to reduce the opportunities for such recreation (since the park wishes to promote recreation opportunities under Visitor Experience Outcome VE2). Since we also observe the changing patterns of boat use on the loch with increasing numbers of canoes, kayaks and paddleboards - at the same time as declining numbers of speedboats, pwcs and motor cruisers, the pressures on the islands are steadily diminishing year by year as small unpowered craft tend to carry less gear and picnic and camp more unobtrusively.

The National Park must go back to basics to ensure it operates: 1) free of charge toilets, which are cleaned regularlary and kept open; 2) litter bins which are emptied daily, including those on the A82 lay-bys. 3) The National Park should actively participate in the management of visitor traffic rather than taking its current passive role. These very basis requirements are satisfactorily met. All other visitor outcomes are secondary. As business rates rise for the tourist industry the National Park must play its role and not assume the private sector and/or volunteers can fill the gap."

Thanks to National

Lottery players, we are delighted to be able to support projects which encourage people to engage with and take ownership of this rich heritage. HLF's dedicated Landscape Partnership scheme takes into account built, natural and cultural heritage at the heart of rural regeneration - connecting people with place. Since 2004, HLF has committed grant-aid totalling £220 million to 125 Landscape Partnership schemes across the UK, including 22 in Scotland with a total value of £41.8 million. The vision is for the communities of Tomintoul and Glenlivet to share and celebrate the hidden heritage of the area, to improve and enhance landscapes, support skills for young people and develop opportunities in the long term for people living and visiting the area. The Overarching Conservation Vision seems to be nothing more than a veiled attempt to reframe Conservation in National Parks The National Parks (Scotland) Act 2000 clearly states the Conservation Aim of National Parks. a) to conserve and enhance the natural and cultural heritage of the area. This is all that is required for a vision statement which is after all is the primary conservation aim of National Parks together with an agreement to abide by the Sandford Principle. The Overarching Vision Statement is unacceptable for a number of reasons: 1. "land and water": The Conservation Vision then goes on to define a unnecessary scope by including "land and water" to frame the conservation vision around your plans to create commercial forests and extend the management of water bodies beyond Loch Lomond related in the priorities. This is a priority outcome specific term, and is no more than an attempt to lay groundwork for your future plans. It has no place in an overarching conservation vision. 2 "valued": Replacing Conservation with "valued" serves in itself to redefine and indeed negate the idea of Conservation as a core aim in the National Park itself and as reinforced in the Sandford Principle. This term should be removed and replaced with Conservation. 3 "managed": Adding the term managed into a conservation aim is a fundamental

change to the nature of the National Park System and it should not be permitted. This is a most brazen attempt to redefine Conservation and deliver absolute power to the National Park Authority to reframe management goals in the National Park as Conservation strategies. Your stated Conservation Priorities, developing commercial joined up forests and communities, and to extend control and management of water bodies across the park is clearly the reason of adding management as a conservation aim so you can claim future management and commercial development has conservation credentials. This term "managed" should not be part of a conservation vision or aim the National Park Act. 4. "multiple benefits": The term multiple benefit is a weasel word benefits is already plural so multiple is superfluous. Again it is used throughout the draft plan without proper explanation as to what the exact nature of these benefits are and so must surly relate to something in another more developed plan. If these are not to be defined they should not be part of an overarching vision statement. In any case benefits is sufficient. Suggested action: Overarching Vision Statement I suggest the overarching vision statement is recognised for what it is, a veiled attempt to change the aims of an Act of Parliament and as such the it should be removed from the draft plan. If you must have a overarching conservation vision it should simply state: "to conserve and enhance the natural and cultural heritage of the area" Do you agree with the 4 Conservation outcomes? [No] I do not agree with any of the 4 conservation outcomes Do you have any specific comments on the outcomes? These relate are National Park Outcomes and are too broad for any satisfactory consultation. The Conservation outcomes are clearly being used to frame specific priorities within the plan so they appear to be development priorities masquerading as Conservation priorities What the consultation document needs to address is the project and priority outcomes, not these broad brush Conservation outcomes. The draft plan does not adequately describe how these outcomes are going to be achieved and therefore as a plan draft or otherwise, it fails. One should reasonably expect if the National Park Authority to have created a document that is for a public consultation to provided a document and supporting information for that document. This document seems to be a summary of a more developed document, it is that document we should be consulting on. Conservation outcome 1: The Park's natural resources are enhanced for future generations: important habitats are restored and better connected on a landscape scale. The use of enhanced should not be permitted here. What make the Park's natural resources natural is the fact the have not been touched. Enhanced should be changed to Conserved or Conserved and Enhanced. "better connected on a landscape scale" is surly an attempt to frame the creation of large scale commercial forests and new settlements in joined up fashion on greenfield sites as a conservation issue rather than the development issue it is. While the Park Authority goes out of it's way to frame commercial forestry as a saviour for landslip and regulation of water movement on the hill side, they remain a commercial development enterprise and their creation does not constitute conservation especially on green field sites whither forested in the past or not. If

trees are required for stabilisation of slopes under the conservation banner they should be native species. The connection elsewhere with communities that are to be joined up is of equal concern, with hints of similar green field use for housing development. So better connected on a landscape scale should be removed from this conservation outcome, and placed in the relevant development outcome instead. Suggested Conservation **Outcome THE PARKS NATURAL RESOURCES ARE** CONSERVED FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS AND **IMPORTANT HABITATS RESTORED. Conservation** Outcome 2: The Park's special landscape qualities and sense of place are conserved and enhanced with more opportunities to enjoy and experience them. "Sense of Place" should not be in an outcome, it's a meaningless phrase widely discredited as weasel words as it has such a broad scope for interpretation' and cannot cannot be measured or monitored. It serves only as an biased aid to convince the consultation respondent that this outcome must be good. "with more opportunities to enjoy and experience them" again alludes to development of these special places for commercial gain while we wish to be able to enjoy and experience them we do not want view points and inappropriate tourist attractions, paid for or not, created in these special places what makes them special is their natural aspect. Tarmac, gates and signage are destroying the natural amenity of the park and your tourist developments are to blame, the park has been happily attracting visitors in it's natural form and does not need enhancing other than basic infrastructure, litter, toilets and parking. It certainly should never be developed in this fashion using conservation to justify it. - No place in a conservation outcome. Why is this outcome important? It's framing for future developments in the north of the park, possibly goldmines and housing, commercial forests and warning us of changes of land use are planned so preparing the way. Again this information must relate to details in a more developed plan, and they should be here for consultation. Inspiring vistas do not need enhancing they need left alone, your propensity to build structures in the most beautiful vistas as tourist attractions is as tacky as it is destructive and should not be associated with conservation outcomes especially on greenfield sites. Then this outcome seems to be suggesting the chopping down of trees or other vegetation along our loch shores and trunk roads to present views to passing tourists, this is not conservation or enhancement it's destruction of the landscape and the vistas. Again the full detail is missing. Suggested conservation outcome - vision THE PARKS SPECIAL LANDSCAPE QUALITIES ARE CONSERVED AND **ENHANCED FOR THE PUBLIC TO ENJOY Conservation** Outcome 3 The natural environment of the Park is better managed to help mitigate and address the impacts of climate change. There is no need for the word "help" as mitigate already covers the concept. The word "better" should also be removed it is superfluous unless there is some underlying but unstated argument for increased management of the park using conservation as a tool to frame that management. This again seems to relate to the commercial development of forestry operations among others and should be identified as such. There is no place for using Conservation as a back door justification for commercial developments, green field or

otherwise, If climate change mitigation is required under the banner of conservation it should be achieved with natural native woodlands. The peat restoration project in in process and the Draft Plan needs to state what has been achieved in the current plan and how much more it still to be done. This is not a conservation outcome at all, management of the land and water environment is not conservation neither is new partnerships it fails to state a conservation aim and is clearly framing the use of conservation as a future tool for managing development goals in the park Not written in plain English and so this has no place in an outcome. Further the plan needs to define what these catchment scale areas are and who is involved within the partnerships, again this consultation document is a summary of a more developed plan and does not provide a proper opportunity to consult when so much detail is missing. "Better" is a weasel word and not required. "integrated management" another weasel word where "management" will suffice, again multiple benefits is a weasel word where benefits is enough. All of these are suggesting that "management", the term the overarching vision has tried to make an aim of the National Parks Act while framing it as a conservation aim. Managed should not be part of a top level conservation vision or outcome. Why is this important? This section again frames the need for partnerships connecting water and land development and suggesting the parks resources are required to be used sustainably, is all quite meaningless as a conservation outcome, if conservation is the intent is should be stated. So an effective consultation is not possible when based on a wish list rather than a definitive plan. It then goes on to provide examples instead of firm details. Referred documents - Strathard Landscape Initiative not provided and can't be found Measurements of success should not be stated only in percentages and the underlying numeric values of the base line should be provided with the reported outcome value. The baseline value should be stated prior to the plan coming into force. Conservation priority 3 While it would be advantageous for the park Authority to target projects that conserve the qualities of wildness quite how wildness can be enhanced has to be explained when what is required is to leave well alone. What is also required is a proactive policy not to allow projects that damage the wild areas in the park using the Candford principle and other measures However are the

Sanutoru principie anu otner measures. nowever are the Park Authority are the biggest single reason for loss of wild areas through their sanctioned developments. Not deterred they have themselves allowed their own interests to destroy the wildness at Loch Chon campsite by damaging the wild forest area adjacent to the shore in creating the campsite in the first instance and failing to control the environmental damage by their contractors in doing so. This practice is been repeated at a number areas Cononish, Hydro Schemes etc. The Sandford Principle should be stated as part of a conservation outcome and a strict policy of protecting the few remaining wild areas of the park needs to be established instead of directing visitors from non wild foreshores to unsuitable wild habitats. Their is something far wrong with the authorities thinking and commercial interest is at the heart of it. Conservation Priority 4 - Landscape enhancements The focus of Priority 4 is about as far from Conservation as one could get and the two priorities listed should be removed and entered as development priorities elsewhere in the plan. As to the support of projects that enhance opportunities to enjoy the landscape by our loch shores that also belongs in a development priority where it is not covered by one of the other conservation priorities. Here in priority 4 where the Park Authority have banned visitors from the major transport routes and loch shores through their management zones and clearways it should be a priority that all these areas should be Conserved until they recover and people can access them once more for recreational camping and leisure they should be protected from development and conserved for future generations. If there are to be enhancements these should be in the form of opening up lay-bys and rustic parking provision and allowing access to loch shores in clearway areas. Conservation **Priority 5 - Landscape enhancements Conservation** Priority 5 is a duplicated in priority 1 - Habitats where woodlands and wetland conservation is already covered and non native invasive species is covered in Priority 2 The Park Authority should confirm that the Creation of woodlands or the restoration of sparse woodlands under the scope of any Conservation priority refers to the planting of native woodland species on a non commercial basis. And that the needs of businesses in a Conservation priority is strictly limited to maintaining the natural environment that attracts visitors to the National Park in the first instance. If the National Park Authority seriously considers that commercial interests or business needs are to be considered as a requirement for Conservation Priority 5 then the should should think again the Conservation should not be linked in any way to development of the landscape for whatever purpose. Conservation Priority 6 -Safeguarding and restoring tranguil loch shore through the your park and respect your park initiatives. This priority should be removed completely, it is not a conservation priority but one for the destruction of our popular places. This is a ridiculous premiss. The loch shores are only valuable in a National Park if visitors and recreational users have access. The park Authorities fixation with reducing visitor numbers by exclusion to these popular areas is not restoration but destruction, where nature will take over and restore the natural balance of the loch shore as inaccessible scrub. Destroying any amenity the park has, driving visitors

away and reducing income for businesses. where even sight of the beaches from a passing bus or train will be lost. The respect you park initiative has failed and is still failing the evidence is everywhere as litter and damaged trees. The your park initiative is a disaster already with permits for caravans and motor homes already failed and such opposition to the park authorities camping provision that they are in danger of a revolt. **Conservation Priority 7 - Peatland Restoration Another** priority claiming Natural Flood and woodland management as a priority. This point is certainly being laboured in this plan and again it comes to the probable expansion of commercial forestry and managing access to the other lochs in the park. And by association forestry development and water with conservation outcomes allows the park to justify the creation of commercial forestry while claiming it's for conservation. The peat restoration project may or may not be additional as it is for controlling floods by natural means but as no projects are listed it's not clear if this is already included under other priorities or not. What is clear that the catchment wide management of peat habitats is not stated fully in this priority an the full list of catchment areas and communities who will benefit from flood mitigation should be provided together with the requisite milestones and a map of the current status of peat restoration from our current plan to provide a baseline against which to measure future achievements. Conservation Priority 8 - Prioritising collaborative land use. This does not sound like a conservation priority it has similar traits to priorities 1, 5 and 7 in so far as it's a priority to mitigate flooding, but this priority has an unexplained element - "collaborative" which may indicate a commercial element to this conservation priority. What the park need to do is explain what this collaborative element entails and who is being collaborated with and what the Park Authorities role in this collaboration will be. The Park Authority need to identify these projects in advance, detail the baseline, the milestones and outcomes of each project and exactly what their input to the projects will be that allows them to claim this as an outcome for the Park Authority and not just some notion that as it happened in the par they can take credit for it. If projects have not been identified at this time it should be removed as a priority. Their should be full disclosure if funding is being provided or disseminated on behalf of another agency for all park projects. Conservation Priority 9 -Create Land Use Partnerships across the park Again the park have to explain how this is a Conservation Project. These plans are again being created in secret behind closed doors without the influence of visitors and recreational users of the park. This park authority is unique in the UK in ignoring visitors and refusing to take their perspective as stakeholders.

The main omission in the Draft plan is any planning whatsoever and so the consultation is effectively useless. All it is trying to achieve is agreement on a very broad set of meaningless headings to justify the future actions of the park authority in all it's connected plans. The draft plan should have already establish the current

The wrate plan should have alleady establish the earlent status of every ongoing project carried forward from the current plan. The the status of all new projects and priorities should also be noted at the start date so that all monitoring of outcomes and deliverables is made against this baseline data. It's difficult to imagine this has not been done already and therefore it is being hidden from the consultation process. Reporting should be formalised and not allowed to deteriorate in the manner the current plan did in 2014, openness and transparency are a key feature in delivery of all these outcomes and efficient and public reporting is a requirement. The Park Authority make claim to having a key role, and infers it is the lead in "having to work with others", in many instances, the plan gives a table of partners at the broad outcome level but failed to attach responsibilities at the priority outcome level, this is essential for proper reporting. The Plan also fails to identify many issues within the park that should be handled through this partnership plan. The most urgent being that it is not visitors or campers that are damaging the park but the National Park Authority and the Planning department, who are failing to manage their own projects to completion, failing to enforce planning contraventions, where huge swathes of the park are left permanently damaged, it is clear there is a serious disconnect in priorities in this National Park where a visitor is pursued as a criminal for leaving rubbish by the roadside where there are no bins, but businesses and commercial interests car tear tracks through the land scape and the Park Authority stand by and even sanctions the damage. These are the key elements a conservation vision should be looking at instead of trying to subvert the conservation aims of National Parks to suit your business goals. The board have already identified the need to implement a broad reaching litter management strategy with the involvement of councils in 2012 for delivery in 2013, they have failed in every subsequent year to delivery this most urgent pieces of infrastructure and the question must be asked why. There is obviously some other non disclosed plan in force preventing that strategy from coming into effect, yet here we are with no partners, no dates for delivery and no proposal for a strategy for the next five years. Their is also serious infrastructure problems with access to parking, curfew where gates are closed denying access to visitors to popular shores in the park. Your current partners have taken over public toilets and these and other toilets are not open when visitors are travelling through or to their destinations before a or 10am and after 4pm or 5 pm then closed in the winter months. The most worrying aspect of this plan is the attempt to frame many development issues as Conservation issues and that must not be allowed to happen, using commercial forestry to mitigate flooding and associate that with conservation should not be permitted, it's forestry development. If flood mitigation is to be carried out under the banner of conservation it should be with native species.

This is aptly bourn out by the quite disastrous camping provision as permit zones and the poor quality pitches at Loch Chon. The opportunities may be well promoted but the are not well managed. Visitor Experience Outcome VE2 There are more opportunities to enjoy water-based recreation and sporting activities across the Park's lochs, rivers and coasts. I disagree with VE2 The National Park authority are being totally disingenuous in the relating the lack of publicly available facilities where they themselves close the only other slipway at Millarocy bringing the number of slipways to 1 on the biggest fresh water loch in the country. It's a disgrace. Of course you are planing to reopen the slipway and lease it to commercial interests, traditional access points to the water you have been removed with clearways and making many of the laybys on single track roads into passing places and fining people for squeezing into them. The new byelaws are not working effectively as you claim, rangers are not

patrolling at the required frequency and the littering and environmental damage goes on unabated with people still camping outside the zone. The intrusion of rangers is not welcomed by everyone as you claim. The use of public transport for poorer families is not an option and more should be done to alleviate the lack of parking in the park and other restrictions your gated curfew impose of visitors. You keep referring to investment in infrastructure, where are the toilets between 5pm and 9 am are few and far between, where do people park by the loch sides or elsewhere in the 720 sq miles of park for that matter. And of course where is the litter bins and strategy that leaves the park an utter mess. Your infrastructure is a myth and I see nothing in the plan on litter management. Car parking for the financially disadvantaged or toilers for the elderly disabled or just normal visitor who you expect to be carrying a trowel and get down on their hunkers behind a bush. Really senior citizens going outdoors. Visitor Experience Outcome VE3 The Park's visitor economy is thriving with more businesses working together to create a world class destination. I doubt the parks visitor economy is thriving at the moment and though the park authority promote the park as a world class destination what we find on the ground is a mismanaged litter strewn mess, with poor infrastructure, poor access to the popular areas of the park. Not a good starting point for a thriving economy. You have shut down water based sports in the park and claim other wise Visitor **Experience Outcome VE4 The most popular parts of the** National Park which experience pressures are managed to ensure that the quality of environment, visitor experience and community life are protected and enhanced. You are margin nothing, you have excluded visitor particularly campers from the popular parts of the park and driven them into other smaller areas where they increase pressures there, so you have just displaced the environmental problem. But of course it was never about the environment it was about control of access and removing people from these popular spots so businesses can take advantage of them. Visitor experience has deteriorated rapidly are they are now herded into unkempt areas of the park with no facility, amenity and quite often no reason to be there. You claim that environmental damage has improved in the management zone areas, that's just not true, it has moved from East Loch Lomond certainly but it has just moved elsewhere it's a failure and the promised solution via ranger patrols is a fiction where the 3 patrols a day just don't happen you don't have the manpower or the will . Visitor Experience Outcome VE5 People from a wider range of backgrounds are enjoying, valuing and helping manage the National Park. it is used more as a place for people to realise the personal health and wellbeing benefits of connecting with nature. Your whole byelaw strategy and permit charges have been socially divisive from the start, your policies have an unfair detrimental effect on the less well off and drives them from the park for reasons of affordability, these people on the whole are the very people that would benefit more through access to the parks for their physical and mental health. You make these statement and there is no evidence presented in the plan, your ranger data is worthless, it is statistically invalid due to the small sample size and it is not a random sample. I have never ana af variu ayanba ay nia abayta that haa

seen one or your graphs or pie charts that has some negative recorded as a park experience and I can confirm that is not what's expressed on social media. It's time the park authority stopped making up these figures and took a more responsible attitude to disseminating false information particularly in an important strategic document such as this. Visitor Experience priority 6 I have no issue with Visitor experience priority 6 based on the information supplied. Visitor Experience priority 7 I strongly object to the extension of management of water craft to other lochs, you have a propensity for justifying every unpalatable thing you do on the basis of unsubstantiated claims of safety issues, clearways, Millarocy, water byelaws without providing any evidence that your actions improve safety or any other aspect of water craft use other than to cause unnecessary cost, and havoc on busy weekends. Visitor Experience priority 8 Having driven out the park users who cannot afford to launch craft from your slipways and suffer the fuel costs to travel the extra distance, you create these socially divisive facilities for the better off members of society. Your "range of users" should extend to the whole of the public no mater what their social background of financial status. This is a National Park for the Few not the many. Visitor Experience priority 9 While improving transport links is an admiral goal the problem of cost will remain an issue for many and so the water bus service as a public transport link is beyond reach and in any case goes nowhere that suits almost all of the working population. The intermittent nature of travel times limits use for recreational purposes where you are more likely to be stranded if you have missed the boat because of problems on the hills. I doubt if these services have any value whatever as a public transport system, they are for tourists. Visitor Experience priority 10 Again you are misunderstanding the needs of a majority of the Scottish Population, those who fish, fish, those who walk, walk and we come to the park to do it on our own terms, when and where we want to do it, in a natural surrounding without pontoons and piers spoiling the views what your are talking about is business development for tourists and charges to access

services. Visitor Experience priority 11 To capitalise on growth markets, we are not a growth market, the NPA are focussing completely on the wrong issues in the park, every thing about their business partners and nothing for park users. They are ignoring the basic principle National Parks were set up for in the first instance. And misunderstand what regular week in week out park user are looking for, instead developing the park into another tacky tourist destination. You misunderstand the nature of nature and it's inherent attractions. Visitor Experience priority 12 The whole purpose of the park is to provide a natural and accessible (no charge) resource for the peoples of Scotland and beyond. This has always been achieved by the fact that the natural beauty of the conserved area was sufficient for recreational park users to get out into nature. You are taking the National Park down the wrong path and subverting it's aims where everything requires investment, enhancement and recreation offerings. The hills and lochs are the very essence of of the park and your creations are destroying the natural amenity the NP system was set up to protect, your theme park mentality is destroying the very essence of the area or as you might say destroying the "sense of place". Visitor Experience priority 13 Your website has improved dramatically over the past 12 months but that was from a very low starting point. The problem is not the technology, that's not a differentiator, it's not just the content either, there are many other websites that provide quality unbiased information about the hills, fishing and every aspect of using the park, and they do it better than you. The problem you have with your website is credibility, and you just have to look at the permit zones you are promoting to see how you are in self destruct mode. The whole visitor experience is based like any other business, on trust, and quite frankly no one who knows you trusts you any more You mis-sell your product, lie about what you are supplying, refuse to compensate unhappy customers and generally ignore health and safety regulations, and trading standards. Once that trust is broken it takes a long while to re establish. Your better joined up consistent and relevant information, your welcome signs at railway stations are all just a waste of money and human resource when you have not provided basic toileting facilities that are open when required first thing in the morning and on the way home in the evening. Litter? Car parking, gated car parks denying access. Your whole operation is defined by glossy brochures, misleading maps and a flashy website, what you actually supply as a visitor experience for many, is abysmal. No Infrastructure! Senior citizens having to toilet outdoors because there are no facilities open? Your claimed lower costs recreational facilities for camping are a fallacy and your charges are more expensive early & late season than commercial sites who have far better facilities available. Visitor Experience priority 14 You whole camping strategy is flawed there is a disconnect between what you think camping is about and the reality of the situation. You have defined permit zones and pitches at campsites that are unusable. You are not a listening organisation, you fail to take criticism even when that criticism is in the long run constructive. When an experienced camper tells you the ground is too steep, to rough or too wet then it's is so. The self belief in your own infallihility needs to ston and you need to

iii your own iinamomity needs to stop and you need to engage with the people who actually camp, fish and use the park not who ever is advising you at the moment, so all the fancy red lines on maps are no more than future disasters waiting to ambush you unless you have taken professional advice from an experienced outdoors person. You have not provided sustainable camping you have driven campers in to small areas in concentrated numbers where damage will inevitably ensue. The whole premiss of your strategy is wrong the spread out recreation model is what's best for park users ad best for the park. Your fixation of micromanaging every aspect of a visitors time in the park by using rangers engagements is the real reason for your permit zones, they benefit no one, not the park, not park users and certainly not the park authorities finances. Visitor Experience priority 15 I strongly object to any interference by the National Park in Loch Lomond islands. Visitor Experience priority 16 You identified the litter management problem at the parks inception it was part of a plan in 2012 to be delivered in 2013 as a joined up litter solution involving councils and the NPA you failed to deliver and here we are again with no stated strategy, no delivery dates, and no explanation of who will do what. Visitor Experience priority 17 It's not traffic management measures that is required it's more parking places. Spread out across the park by loch shores and beauty spots, the traffic management problems are of the NPA making. Visitor Experience priority 18 Your educational campaign may have some impact over generations of park users, but as long a teacher and parents teach children from a very early age to put litter in bins, that is where the population is going to look first. It is clear if you persist with this failing strategy that it is necessary to clean the rubbish left behind to stop it accumulating as it is currently creating a further poor impression of the park as a whole. The reduction of parking spaces across the park when they went through their modification to "town centre" car parks rather than the rustic higher capacity versatile parking we once had, together with your instigation of clearways and the closing or enforcement of lay-bys as passing places has displaced many visitors leaving no where to go except villages. It's not a visitor management problem it's an infrastructure problem and until the park stops pretending otherwise and creates spread out lochside locations then the issues will continue. It's also a strange concept the on the one hand when the NPA talks about business opportunity and development potential because of the nearby Glasgow conurbation then in the very next sentence slates visitors as a problem that needs to be managed - you can't have it both ways. Just like litter you will happily sell and retain profit from goods with wrappers on, but expect it to be taken home for Glasgow City Council to foot the bill for litter disposal. If it's bought in the park it's the parks litter problem. Rural Development Outcome 2 "The park offers many opportunities for business growth," they are not listed in the plan? "Overall," what does it mean it's a weasel word designed to avoid giving the direct answer. It has no place in a development plan, This plan continues to read like a pitch for funding not a key policy document. As long as the NPA attitude and it would seem local communities, land owners and businesses continue to treat park users with disdain, something to be managed instead of cherished and with the NPA leading the way on this one, it's no wonder business development has stalled so badly. We visitors don't like to be managed and micro-managed by your rangers or traffic management plans. We come to the park to enjoy the amenity for a few precious short days at the weekend and you are progressively removing that amenity with your endless restrictions closed car parks and charges and no facilities, You are sucking the pleasure out of the park and suppressing the tourist industry as you go and creating divisions in society. Visit Scotland has made great strides in changing the face of Scotland's tourist industry the NPA are putting it all at risk with their failure to deliver. Broadband: You fail to provide the information as before how many and what communities have super fast broadband and what is the schedule for rolling it out to others, is it fiction or

fact, give dates. Rural Development Outcome 3 Population decline is being addressed by attracting and retaining more skilled working age and young people within the National Park. Attracting people to the National Park to live and work is only going to be achieved if there are well paid well structured jobs to be had in the National Park. The past year has shown little success at these business development aims and employment prospects remain poor certainly for local people. You are deluded if you think the rural economy can support a better class of job than equivalent businesses in the city, on the contrary economies of scale and remoteness work against the rural economy and the pay grade will suffer. The as yet undisclosed plans for forest development on a massive scale runs counter to the conservation aims of the National Park System and it would appear the NPA has forsaken the reasons it exists for purely commercial goals an satisfying a few low value tick boxes in fulfilling some element of a Plan for Scotland, at least they are regular Jobs. Your low cost housing is typically not accessible to the type of jobs available in the tourist sector with low pay and poor prospects. Even some jobs at LLTNPA don't meet the grade. You fail to state what skills how they are being attracted and retained. Rural Development Outcome 4 The plan fails to give enough information as to the nature of this outcome where the priorities seem to give the power to local residents to self determine what happens on the ground in their communities it's not what we see in reality, Loch Chon at the scale delivered was opposed by local communities and yet here we are. This outcome does not simply relate to the Rural Development Priorities associated with it and does not cover community ownership or the selling of forests for community purchase. It fails to elaborate on why it's good for communities and the wider National Park. Not really giving much opportunity for consultation when the bulk of the information is missing.

Conservation Outcome 1 We support this outcome but as noted above the lack of evidence to set the wider context means it is difficult to comment more specifically on the priorities. To give one example, while we support the intention to create "more extensive and better connected forest and woodland networks", there is no detail of the kind of woodland expansion that is proposed. At one end of the spectrum, much of the national park is currently covered with dense, historic sitka spruce plantations which, among other things, can set an impenetrable barrier along great swathes of the park for people to access the hills beyond them. More information about plans to fell or thin and replant these forests in a more sensitive way, or to provide better routes through the forestry, would be helpful. On the other hand, while we fully support expansion of native species woodland, our preference is for this to happen through natural regeneration and by reducing the number of deer, rather than solely by use of deer fencing to keep out grazing animals. Fencing can cause difficulties for those enjoying outdoor access if there are not sufficient crossing points, as well as having a landscape impact. We accept that the national park authority can only encourage private landowners to carry out more sustainable land management practices. Maulina in nautoavahin in avasa which are aver

working in partnership in areas which are owned by public bodies or NGOs is helpful in providing examples of good practice to demonstrate the benefits of this land use to others, but the park also needs to be clearer in setting out the context for its vision on for sustainable land use, so that landowners are more aware of the evidence for the outcomes sought. Conservation Outcome 2 We agree with this outcome as it stands but feel that a number of issues are missing from the supporting text. Also, as noted above it is disappointing that no recreation bodies are included as delivery partners in this area of work, especially as there are priority work areas (eg. Conservation Priority 6) which are aiming to change visitor behavior and would benefit from input from such representative organisations. Firstly, in relation to Conservation Priority 3, we have no detail on how the park will carry out this work. As members of the Scottish Environment LINK Hilltracks sub-group we have been monitoring the growth of tracks in upland areas across Scotland which are one type of development which can impact on the wild qualities of the landscape as well as potentially causing environmental damage. With regard to the building of new hill tracks for forestry or agricultural purposes. prior notification is now required by land managers but not full planning permission unless the tracks fall within the proportion of the park which is also a National Scenic Area. We would be pleased if the park could send a strong signal that new tracks should not normally be constructed within the park on open moorland, as is the case within the Cairngorms NP Partnership Plan, which would help to give a greater measure of protection of the special landscape qualities of the park. In relation to current track construction, those which are causing the most concern to the LINK group are those relating to some hydro schemes. While we are not opposed to small scale hydro projects per se, the lack of effective monitoring and enforcement of planning conditions on some schemes within the national park have been highlighted to us, including a poor standard of mitigation measures. We therefore would like a stronger commitment to ensure that schemes are monitored throughout the construction phase and that the park's own planning guidance is strictly enforced. We believe that the proposed measure of success to ensure that mitigation schemes are in place is not strong enough. With regard to Conservation Priority 4, it is clearly important to retain good lines of sight from the main trunk roads within the park, but it is disappointing that this is the only measure mentioned in the text with regard to helping visitors to be inspired through the landscape. We would suggest that identifying strategic laybys or car parks and providing supporting infrastructure such as path networks, litter bins, toilets and interpretation information would be helpful in enabling people to explore the park rather than simply driving through it and looking at the views. Finally, in terms of Conservation Priority 6, our opposition to the national park camping byelaws is known, but we fully support the education efforts of the park and are pleased to play our own role with regard to promoting responsible access to the public. However, while education is important, it is also crucial to ensure that people are able to do the right thing easily and it is our view that greater provision of infrastructure (toilets, litter bins, campsites) in heavily visited areas is also

essential. Conservation Outcomes 3 and 4 There is a great deal to support within these sections, in particular the commitment to tackle overgrazing, the impact of deer levels and plans for peatland restoration. We are also pleased to see the proposal to create Regional Land Use Partnerships. However again there is very little detail on how to achieve these outcomes.

Visitor Experience The outcomes within this section seem appropriate. We have a number of comments to make with regard to the delivery of these outcomes, but as noted above we have also learnt that the park is planning a review of its outdoor recreation plan later this year and so will restrict our comments to more general points at this stage in expectation of being invited to engage in the review in due course. Visitor Experience Outcome 1 We are aware from VisitScotland surveys that short walks are the most popular form of physical activity for visitors to Scotland and assume that this is a similar situation for those coming to the national park. Therefore we support the continued development of recreation networks as we believe that an extensive, well-promoted and well-maintained path network forms the basis for encouraging larger numbers of people to enjoy the park on foot or by bike during their visit, and thus benefiting from the physical and mental health benefits of being active outdoors. Once again, it is disappointing that no recreation bodies are listed as partners for delivery but government and community bodies are included. As a representative body and membership organisation as well as a governing body of sport, Ramblers Scotland has a large

network and can add value to the park's promotional work relating to all types of paths. We have a number of members who are working as volunteers in support of some of these projects and others who may be keen to be engaged in path survey work. We are also currently working with the park authority through a National Access Forum sub-group on a project relating to core path plans. Visitor Experience Outcome 2 We support this outcome and continued efforts to improve the Waterbus network to enable more people to use the loch for part of their walking experiences. This is particularly important in reducing private car use within the park once people have arrived there, but information on public transport links to the waterbus or cycle carrying facilities would also enable exploration of the park for those without a car. Visitor Experience Outcome 3 We support this outcome although would caution that the park needs to ensure that those coming to the park to enjoy free outdoor activities are not being discouraged, whether that's walking, cycling, picnicking or camping in those areas where the byelaw does not apply. We are pleased to see a recognition of the need to provide lower cost accommodation types and in particular campsites. We believe that more campsites, both formal and informal (ie, setting aside of a field at busy weekends during the summer) would help to encourage more people of diverse backgrounds to visit the park. However, overall the existing priorities suggest there needs to be more of a commitment from the park to plan for the needs of visitors rather than simply supporting and encouraging the private sector to provide facilities. We believe the park needs to consider the use of compulsory purchase powers if landowners are not demonstrating a real willingness to collaborate in finding a solution to this problem. We fully agree with the statement that rail travel to the park is underpromoted and the priority 13 commitment to deliver improved welcomes at railway stations. However, currently the train and long distance bus schedules from Glasgow and Edinburgh do not encourage use of public transport for days out in the park with long gaps between trains. Also, the lack of bicycle carrying capacity is an issue, especially for those travelling in a group, Visitor Experience Outcome 4 While we agree with the outcome, we would like to see more evidence relating to the current situation to help us better understand the chosen priority areas. There are clearly honeypot areas within the park but we suggest a strategy is needed to manage the visitor pressure where it occurs and also to encourage visitors to move beyond these places and spread the visitor numbers more widely. In terms of transport, there is a need to consider both how best to enable visitors to arrive by public transport and also how to encourage people to travel around the park by public transport, walking or cycling once they have arrived by car. These are two separate issues and need different strategies to deal with them. It would be useful to see evidence of the proportion of visitors using different modes of transport and the potential areas where, for example, cycle hire might work well, or indeed consideration of a shuttle bus service to Rowardennan from Balloch station or connected to a park-and-ride facility along the east side of Loch Lomond. We will comment on these issues more fully in the forthcoming review of the outdoor recreation plan. With regard to Visitor Experience

Priority 14 on the camping management plan, our position is unchanged from before the introduction of the byelaws. We recognise the need to manage visitor pressure from large numbers of people enjoying informal camping activities but we continue to believe that the camping byelaws are unnecessary, and instead investment should be directed towards the creation of new campsites, provision of other visitor facilities and ongoing educational work on what responsible access means. This should be supported by enforcement of existing legislation on littering, etc, where problems arise. We are of the belief that the camping byelaws should be removed following three years of their implementation, when the required final report on their effect is submitted to Scottish Ministers, and that there should be no extension of the area which is currently covered by byelaws. We urge the park to ensure that there has been sufficient investment in facilities and other management measures by that time to enable park resources to be deployed in more positive ways to promote responsible visitor behavior, rather than in policing responsible campers. We would also like to add that we fully support Visitor Experience Priority 16 and any initiatives to tackle litter, but we believe a multiagency approach in partnership with the community and voluntary sectors is needed. This could be used as an exemplar for dealing with this issue which sadly exists across the whole of Scotland and is not entirely related to visitors, given the problems of fly-tipping and marine litter which blight the area. We are always happy to support educational campaigns related to promoting responsible enjoyment of the park, adding value where possible to these initiatives, and would also support low cost camping initiatives. Finally, on p21 of the consultation document there is a statement about the historical "highly seasonal, weather dependent visitor economy". While we do not dispute that this is currently the case, we would urge the park to treat the high numbers of people visiting the park during these times as an opportunity and to consider how to manage the challenges of such 'boom and bust' and the subsequent prospects for businesses within the park if more people are attracted to visit the park on a year-round basis. Scotland's natural heritage has much of interest to offer throughout the seasons, as highlighted in recent nature television programmes featuring the park and its wildlife across four seasons, and most types of outdoor recreation likewise are year-round activities. It is therefore essential in making the shift to encourage higher levels of visitors throughout the year that a certain level of facilities, such as public toilets, remain open. In addition, low cost interventions like the construction of simple covered shelters on popular walking routes would encourage groups not to cancel walking activities on wet days if they are aware of sheltered places where they can eat their lunches. The proximity of the park to large centres of population is an advantage in encouraging people to take advantage of the attractions of the park throughout the year. Visitor **Experience Outcome 5 These are very worthwhile** priorities and we support this outcome but feel that the activities and measures of success lack ambition. It is important to recognise that the park can create the conditions for others to benefit from in terms of health benefits gained from enjoying physical activity in the natural anvironment. This includes extending the nath

natural environment. This includes extending the path networks within the park and ensuring that they are well-signed and well-maintained, and providing low cost accommodation and car-free travel options. Recreation bodies and especially those which are also governing bodies of sport can play a partnership role in delivering this outcome.

In particular, from our perspective there is a lack of information related to those priorities set out within the Visitor Experience section. For example, we are not given statistics on a breakdown of what type of visitors come to the park and during which months, what proportion of visitors do particular activities, their expectations, the modes of transport they use, how far they travel from home, etc. We assume the park has much of this evidence and it would be very helpful for us if it were provided in an easily-available format, as was provided by the Cairngorms NPA in their own partnership plan consultation, to help assess this current document and better understand the basis for directing the investment and operational priorities which will flow from this plan. From discussion with park staff, we are aware that a review of the Outdoor Recreation Plan is going to be undertaken shortly, but this plan is not referred to at all in the document, nor the forthcoming review. Lack of recreation body involvement: it is striking that there is no recreation user representative body listed as a partner within this partnership plan, despite the fact that the promotion of outdoor recreation is one of the four main aims of national parks in Scotland and on p9 of the document there is a commitment to use the opportunity of the NPP to "strengthen partnership working". The vast majority of those people who visit the park come to enjoy walking, mountaineering, watersports, angling, cycling, horse riding or other outdoor activities, and it is therefore disappointing that no recreation body is felt to merit partnership status to represent the interests of this constituency. This includes umbrella organisations like the Scottish Sports Association (SSA) which represents governing bodies of sport. By contrast landowning and community interests are well represented as partners, but even where NGOs are included they are usually there in their role as landowning charities, such as RSPB Scotland, National Trust for Scotland, or Woodland Trust, or for their role in volunteer support activity, such as the John Muir Award. Clearly much work has gone into building capacity and engaging with local communities, but from our perspective the wider community of interest has had little engagement with park authority staff and therefore is not included within this plan. Instead recreation bodies like ourselves are relegated to being treated as a stakeholder in the park. One example of this is that we are invited, along with other sectors, to the stakeholder forum related to the implementation of the camping management plan. These events are occasions for the

park statt to provide a welcome update on the park's activities rather than being opportunities for true engagement in developing the park's plans. Ramblers Scotland has raised the issue of lack of engagement with recreation bodies by the park authority over many years. We accept that the park authority staff are experienced and knowledgeable with regard to outdoor recreation management, but their remit is that of a public body involved in visitor management, rather than coming from the perspective of the users of the park. Therefore it is crucial that this sector is more fully engaged. We urge the park authority to set up mechanisms for regular engagement with key representative organisations like ourselves and also through SSA and with Scottish Environment LINK whose members include smaller membership organisations often with highly knowledgeable members who are particularly interested in the conservation management objectives of the national park but who are not landowning NGOs themselves and can speak from the perspective of many visitors to the park.

• SDS supports the fact that skills are woven through the draft plan and are positioned as an enabler to allow the National Park to reach the aims set out in the draft plan and especially in the Rural Development section. • Access to employment and training will have an impact on attracting and retaining people to live in the National Park and as such. Priorities 2. 4. 10 and 15 are of particular interest and relevance to skills development. • SDS suggests expanding Priority 9 to include coordination to allow start ups to access training to support business development. • Priority 11 'identification of skills gaps, provision of training and skills development support' reflects the recommendations given by SDS to conduct a skill survey of employers in the Park. This data, combined with the evidence base prepared by SDS would provide a comprehensive snapshot of current skills landscape which could be used to measure impact of future activities. • SDS suggests that developing relationships with Local Authorities, industry associations, training providers and employers operating within the National Park provide further insight and opportunities to work towards common goals. • SDS suggests establishing performance measurements closely aligned to skills including uptake of Modern Apprenticeships and other training. • The National Park Authority is well placed to serve as a coordinating and information sharing role to match employer demand with supply of labour and skills. • Given the scope of work and relevance to multiple aspects of the partnership plan, SDS encourages the development of a Skills Strategy and Action Plan and a dedicated resource to implement the plan, coordinate and disseminate information and build relationships with local delivery partners.

Comments:

• Skills Development Scotland welcomes the inclusion of skills in the Loch Lomond and Trossachs Draft National Park Plan 2018-23 (the draft plan) and is pleased to collaborate with the National Park Authority to establish a robust evidence base to underpin future action. • The inclusion of skills issues in the draft plan reflects the Scottish Government's commitment to developing skills, as evidenced in the Economic Strategy, Labour Market Strategy and Developing the Young Workforce recommendations, Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park Evidence Base • SDS's work to establish and analyse economic and skills data has highlighted both challenges and opportunities for the National Park and areas where additional evidence is required to make informed and effective decisions on skills strategy. • Key sectors for the National Park both in terms of economic performance and employment include Tourism and Food and Drink (including Agriculture). • The majority of employers in the National Park are micro enterprises. This presents a challenge as training costs can be more expensive for smaller enterprises and compounded by the rural nature of the National Park, making access to training providers more difficult. • Employment forecasts to 2024 show that there will be future demand for jobs, largely arising from

replacement demand created by people leaving the job market due to retirement or other reasons. In terms of meeting this demand the draft plan includes Rural Development Outcome 3: "Population decline is being addressed by attracting and retaining more skilled working age and young people within the National Park." • SDS agrees that attracting and retaining the working age population should be an objective which can be reached by supporting access to training and jobs. However, it should also be considered whether older residents of the Park could also be encouraged to help to address the needs of the Tourism industry, by for example, fulfilling part-time customer facing roles. • While the evidence base can provide insights, there is a lack of data on school leaver destinations and training and skills gaps at an appropriate spatial level which is useful for planning. SDS has agreed to further support the National Park by providing a bespoke cut of data on School Leaver Destinations and uptake of Modern Apprenticeships in the National Park. It is recommended that the National Park Authority conducts a skills survey of employers within the park boundaries to establish their specific needs in terms of skills gaps and skills shortages. This additional information will provide a comprehensive picture of skills demand and supply in the National Park and allow the Park Authority to allocate resources and plan activity accordingly. • SDS recommends working with relevant industry groups to share resources and work towards common goals. SDS can facilitate contact with the relevant industry groups. Tourism • Accommodation and Food Services is the largest sector in terms of employment, with 22.7 per cent of jobs. Compared with the Scotland average of 8.1 per cent this shows just how significant the tourism sector is in terms of Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park (LLTNP) employment. Other sectors such as arts, entertainment and recreation, which are aligned to tourism, are also more concentrated in the LLTNP than the national average. • SDS's Sector Manager for Tourism has highlighted the opportunities for skills development to support the National Park to deliver a world class visitor experience. • The Skills Investment Plan (SIP) for Tourism highlights that digital skills are becoming more important and should be prioritised, along with management and leadership, with a continuing focus on the skills needed to ensure high quality customer experience. • In terms of supply, the SIP notes the high proportion of migrant workers in the sector and the impact of Brexit on this labour supply. Food and Drink (including Agriculture) • The Food and Drink SIP notes that raising the attractiveness of the sector, driving leadership and management excellence, developing skills for business improvement and business growth are established skills issues in the Food & Drink industry. • Employers in the Agriculture sector frequently face challenges around labour supply and access to training as a result of being located in rural locations. • As a sector employing a large proportion of migrant labour, uncertainty around the status of EU workers is a further cause for concern employers in Agriculture. • In addition, there are widespread misconceptions that the Agriculture sector offers only manual and low skilled roles, witha lack of understanding of the highly technical and specialist careers available. • SDS is working with industry partners in the rural sector to address the specific

challenges around skills, piloting new innovative approaches including Shared Apprenticeship models. SDS would be keen to have further dialogue with Loch Lomond National Park to look for opportunities in joint working and collaboration. Creative Industries • As an area of outstanding natural beauty, the Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park has a unique offering for those wishing to escape the pressures and pollution of urban life. Technological advances now make remote working more feasible and, depending on the quality of broadband on offer, the National Park could be an attractive and inspiring place to live and work for people in, for example, the Creative Industries. • The development of creative digital skills and their application to the National Park's strategic conservation, visitor experience and rural development visions are central to the communication and promotion of this work, but critical to the successful marketing of the overall proposition to new and diverse day, overnight and extended stay visitors. • A key issue for Scotland's natural heritage agencies is how best to tell its story to new, more diverse audiences than ever before across key platforms and social media channels. SDS's Sector Manager for the Creative Industries was involved in the National Parks School Poster Competition a few years ago, and it was clear that staff and local businesses were very engaged in supporting, funding and promoting this skills development, transfer and progression. • There is a case for the Park and the many tenant businesses to look to utilise the new Foundation Apprenticeship in Creative Digital Media to develop vounger talent and to make them aware of the new creative technology opportunities that exist. Also, to consider perhaps how best to support and fund the employment of Creative Digital apprentices directly, or on a shared model to work to provide the digital assets that all businesses need to promote and sell services and goods, and allow engaged communications with existing and new users and audiences. This would also act as a local talent retainer for the Park, allowing young people to evolve current in-demand skillsets and remain in the area. • A further area for consideration is the whole area of heritage and contemporary crafts and design and the sustainable use of the resources of the Park. A number of sites currently promote creative and cultural activities as a visitor attraction, leisure activity and a creative economic output in its own right. SDS is currently working with Applied Arts Scotland on a shared apprenticeship model for Crafts Business at Level 3, which is gaining great interest from the Scottish Government, as it is working on a deeply inclusive agenda for young people with learning, behavioural and mental health needs and, at the same time, bringing micro-businesses who are possibly least engaged with workforce development and skills into action.

The key priorities that this business group identified are set our below: VE1 - Consider "grouping" these priorities to ensure that path and route developments and increased recreation opportunities are co-ordinated across communities to develop a stronger network that encourages visitors to explore more of the National Park. Prioritise filling in missing sections or gaps in potentially circular routes such as the Crianlarich to Killin section of the Pilgrim's Way. VE2 – Improvement to the piers and pontoons infrastructure across Loch Lomond & Loch Katrine including better disabled access and the introduction of shelters. There is support for increasing the number of water based activities but it is felt that attention should also be paid to increasing the quality of existing provision. expansion? In general we are supportive of small-scale woodland expansion, primarily of native woodland, but not exclusively so. Particularity along burnsides and other riparian features, where farmers and land managers could also benefit from strategic fencing and new shelter woodlands. This could have the added benefit of creating wider woodland habitat networks particularly where a number of farmers or land managers are working together i.e. planting smaller areas on a number of farms or estates. Opportunities for integrating new woodlands and management of existing woodlands and adoption of agro-forestry approaches should be positively encouraged. NFUS would like to see the introduction of a National Park planting premium to support the planting of small-scale farm woodlands. Current establishment costs and low levels of grant support (particularly for native woodland) make farm woodland expansion within the National Park unaffordable. However, any new woodland planting needs to be carefully considered so that it does not jeopardise the ability to produce food, particularly safeguarding better quality land for agricultural production. However, also concerns about the loss of upland grazing habitats and hefted sheep at the expense of new woodland planting. Do trees in the longer term deliver the same level of economic benefit - could some modelling work, or cost-benefit analysis, be done within the park to compare upland grazed landscapes V new woodland planting? CP1: Habitats Wetlands - NFUS members are concerned over the apparent decline in numbers of wetland breeding birds e.g. curlew and lapwings. CP2: Species - needs to be recognised that some species do not operate on a water catchment level e.g. grey squirrels will cross catchment boundaries. CP3: This needs clarification that 'enhance qualities of wildness' does not mean re-wilding? Also there were concerns that this priority should not seek to restrict opportunities for the development of renewable energy projects. CP5 - this appears to duplicate what has been said in CP1 and CP2, either needs to be incorporated in these or re-worded? CP7 - again seems to be some duplication with other priorities in relation to the various initiatives? CP11 - this should also focus on the uncertainty facing farmers and land managers i.e. mention some of the threats as well as opportunities and the need for resilience planning in the face of Brexit? NFUS believes that there should be specific mention made of the need to support thriving agricultural businesses in order to deliver the wider public benefits and outcomes for the NPA. It would be worth mentioning the role of a NPA Land Use Forum? NFUS welcomes the ambition to deliver the role out of Whole Farm and Whole Estate Management Plans, whilst recognising that these will have a significant resource requirements in terms of funds and staff time. **Could the cost of Integrated Land Management Plans** (ILMP), as delivered by Scottish Government under the Farm Advisory Service, be further subsidised by the NPA?

CP1: Habitats - NFUS would like to see an additional priority habitat of open grazed grassland, which with appropriate management could help to support a number of species. The role of cropping should also be recognised as being important in supporting a range of species and enhancing biodiversity. CP2 Species -NFUS would like to see Canada geese recognised as an invasive non-native species and action identified to help deal with the impacts that they are responsible for, along with support for dealing with the ever increasing numbers of Greylag geese. There needs to be a more strategic approach to goose management in the National Park, involving a range of stakeholders e.g. farmers, land mangers, RSPB, golf course owners/managers. NFUS members suggested that the Curlew should be identified as a flagship species, particularly in relation to wetlands and grazed grassland.

The Scottish Pilgrim Routes Forum is focussed on the Across Scotland route between Iona/Oban and St Andrews. A route that is within the NWCN programme. As you will be aware this across Scotland route has for reasons of development been split into varying sections and the Three Saints Way Steering Group, of which SPRF are a very active part, is one such section. For this group the route starts within your park area in Killin and using the Rob Roy Way comes south to Lochearnhead. The route is then envisaged as using paths on the north side of loch earn walking east along to St Fillans. It is in this Loch Earn section that we wish to see a strong focus in the formalising of a walking path which in the main would use the old railway track. Clearly in some sections work and investment has been made however it is important that the balance of this route now requires focus. Via funding from SNH there has been scoping work done on route options and we would like to see early consultation with LLTNP in terms of the outcome of this scoping work and investment in further path development in this section of the park. Secondly we are aware that between Tyndrum and Killin or Tyndrum and Lochearnhead there is a need to undertake much more work in finding a linking path that would facilitate the Across Scotland Way. SPRF's vision is that the route would follow the WHW from Tyndrum to Crianlarich and then make use of Glen Dochart for at least part of the walk. Further east the options might be to continue on Glen Dochart towards RRW close to Killin or break off Glen Dochart and go via a hill path to Balguhidder and then using the cycle route/RRW arrive in Lochearnhead from the south side. SPRF would like to see this section between Tyndrum and the Three Saints Way as major priority and one that our members could play an active and supportive part in route identification and discussions. The growth and interest in pilgrimage ways is both with domestic and international walkers and we know through member organisations that focus on international pilgrim walkers that there is a significant economic opportunity for the establishment of both the Three Saints Way as an entity in its own right as well as an even greater demand and opportunity for the establishment of the NCWN Iona to St Andrews Pilgrim route

the large number of priorities identified (50 in total) against a backdrop of public sector revenue and capital funding declining significantly in real terms which is likely to be exacerbated further with the disappearance of European structural funds during the plan period. We would have preferred to see a tighter list of around 30 priorities (10 per strategic theme) with the limited resources likely to be available targeted at those priorities that will make a real difference in delivering the vision and outcomes the lack of reference to the resources required for delivering the identified priorities and outcomes. It is important that the funding requirements and funding context features somewhere in the final version of the PPP as there is little or nothing on this in the current version of the PPP which we consider is a major weakness. Clear SMART principles should be adhered to in taking the PPP from draft to final version which would greatly help to present the case for more resources to be targeted at delivering the various priorities and outcomes by the partner agencies We support conservation priority 6 but suggest the wording is altered to recognise the importance of loch shores for conservation and quiet recreation purposes. The Strahard Ecoservices project is featured under C3 and under conservation priority 7 mention is made of working with communities to build resilience and mitigate against climate change impacts by undertaking various initiatives yet under the list of lead delivery and support delivery partners there is no mention of the Community Partnership or local communities. This is a serious omission and should be rectified in the final PP

Under C2 we welcome the references to the importance of continuing 'to provide good lines of sight to the stunning views of the iconic landscapes found here' but are disappointed there are no specific actions identified to maintain or improve views from scenic routes which are such a key feature of the National Park. We suggest a specific action relating to the selective removal of stretches of trees and shrubs along scenic routes should be included in this section. There is scope to build on the previous joint 'views from the road' tree removal initiative developed for stretches of the A82 by the Friends with support from the NPA and Transport Scotland. Further work is also required to capitalise on the national scenic routes initiative that was successfully piloted by the NPA.

no mention of the impact of the cross-agency reduction in resources in real terms being targeted at the maintenance of the basic infrastructure of the National Park with poor and uncoordinated litter management services, poorer public toilet provision, deteriorating piers around Loch Lomond and poorly maintained public car parks and public realm at many honeypot locations. The fabric and quality of the public infrastructure has deteriorated significantly over the past decade at a number of locations throughout the National Park. However, there have been some notable successes in the Trossachs area as a result of the NPA securing special Scottish Government funding for 'shovel ready projects an issue that requires to be addressed in the new PPP with more emphasis being placed on a 'back to basics agenda' as part of delivering the vision for the National Park; We consider this section should re-badged to include a specific reference to outdoor recreation (see above). This would help align the PPP more clearly with the NP's objective "to promote understanding and enjoyment, including enjoyment in the form of recreation, of the special qualities of the area by the public" and help counteract recent criticism from some recreational bodies that providing recreational opportunities for all is not a high priority for the NPA and its partners. We agree with the visitor experience vision as it places an emphasis on providing high quality and authentic experiences for visitors from all backgrounds

They should be recognised more fully as delivery partners and feature more in the list of those involved in helping deliver specific outcomes and priorities; We also agree with the four outcomes proposed to focus efforts on although we would like to see a reduction in the number of actions from 20 as there is a danger of resources being spread too thinly and not making a major impact on some of the higher priority and higher impact actions. There is scope also to merge some of the actions and cross reference more to the existing recreation plan that is currently being implemented by the NPA with support from other VE2 could perhaps be modified to read "There are better and more opportunities to enjoy water-based recreation and...". There should not simply be an emphasis on creating more opportunities at the expense of investing more in enhancing existing opportunities with, for example, upgrading existing piers and providing shelters for the hundreds of thousands of visitors enjoying boat trips on lochs throughout the National Park. The text in VE1 is very misleading as it gives the impression the NP is aiming to have a wide variety of outdoor recreation opportunities when all the supporting text and six supporting priority actions focus solely on walking and cycling. While walking and cycling are important there needs to be an acknowledgement there are other forms of outdoor recreation that will be nurtured and encouraged in the National Park. More passive activities such as sightseeing and picnicking are important activities in the National Park as are activities provided by Outdoor **Education and Recreation Centres and various activity** providers. The list of walking and cycling actions could be simplified and cross referenced to the Recreation Plan where there are also references to a wider range of sports and recreation provision. Reference to a broader range of outdoor activities is sadly lacking in this section. If the priority is to simply focus in on paths then the wording in the VE2 outcome should be more specific. Under VE2 we welcome the acknowledgement of the need to invest in infrastructure to grow waterbased tourism in the Park but it should also be noted there is a need to upgrade the existing infrastructure to ensure existing and future visitors have an enjoyable experien We are pleased to see under VE3 there is a reference to the "significant opportunity to make more of the Park's rich landscapes and the wide range of recreation experiences.." as the Friends are currently working on an eco-tourism initiative with funding support from Scottish Enterprise and this will continue for part of the period covered by the PPP. The Friends should be added to the list of support delivery partners We would agree with the comments under VE5 as there is considerable potential to develop and provide more opportunities for young people in nearby urban areas to visit, enjoy and learn about the Park. There is still a long way to go in targeting young people and engaging them effectively in recreational and educational opportunities in the National Park and this is an area which requires more resources allocated to make a real difference in terms of scale of penetration levels

Under VE priority 8 Loch Katrine should be added as there are plans to upgrade derelict piers and shelters there with a scheme for Brenachoile Pier recently securing European Leader funding support. As mentioned earlier the emphasis should also not simply be on providing more accessible boating and recreational facilities but also on much needed upgrading of what we already have. Under VE priority 13 reference is made to a suite of actions including investing in digital visitor information and contemporary marketing. We would suggest 'contemporary' should be replaced by 'relevant and user friendly marketing' as there is still an important role for 'on arrival print' given the mix of markets currently attracted to the National Park and the substantial gaps in access to wifi and mobile phone signals in large parts of the National Park. The wording in VE priority 16 would benefit from being changed to better capture the nature of the priority. Suggested wording 'Introducing better co-ordinated and well-resourced litter management arrangements at busy visitor locations and along heavily used visitor corridors such as the A82, including marine litter on Loch Long".

Reference to a broader range of outdoor activities is sadly lacking in this section We would like to see a specific action relating to taking forward a piers, pontoons and shelter initiative as the quality of the current infrastructure is poor when compared with international destinations. Private boat trip operators and trusts are investing heavily in new and upgraded boats and are attracting many hundreds of thousands of visitors on boat trips despite the poor condition of the piers around Loch Lomond, Loch Katrine and the Clyde Sea Lochs. If we are serious about delivering a world class visitor experience then a good starting point would be to invest in an initiative like this through genuine collaborative working with boat operators. Around Loch Lomond it would be helpful if the rental income generated from pier dues was reinvested in pier upgrading and associated shelter provision.

Q19 Is your organisation willing to sign up to the delivery of the priorities?

If you answered yes, what/how does your organisation intend to contribute?:

Under support delivery partners for path related initiatives the Friends should be listed as we have invested heavily in the promotion and development of paths over the last 5 years through Friends of OUR park voluntary visitor giving and volunteering scheme. We are also committed to raising £20,000 from visitors to support the Mountains and the People project and have recently agreed to partner with Luss Estates to progress a Luss Quarries circular path project and with Helensburgh and District Access Trust we are promoting an ambitious Luss Glens Paths project which is likely to feature in a multi-million pound bid to OFGEM by the power companies shortly. We are also financially supporting the production of a range of paths booklets and maps being developed by local community groups. Friends have made practical inputs to VE priority 14 and 15 and we would hope to continue to do so.On the litter front we have organised voluntary litter picks at key blackspots. We are also actively lobbying for litter management to be better coordinated and resourced with the provision of adequate litter bins which are emptied more frequently at busier visitor locations such as Luss, Balmaha and Arrochar as well as along busy trunk routes such as the A82

Q20 Are there other organisations that you think should be included as delivery partners? If so, please detail.

Under the 'who can make this happen' local businesses and trusts should be added. The NPA needs the private boat operators and Trusts such as the Steamship Sir Walter Scott to improve and develop the waterbus network. Surprised to see SportScotland as the lead partner given their lack of involvement in provision to date but if this is a coded way of putting them 'in the hot seat' to help deliver funding to develop the water based recreation infrastructure provision then fine.

We are surprised that individual local tourism businesses do not feature under either the lead delivery or support delivery partners given they will be directly responsible for investing in the range of visitor offerings and will be responsible for day to day management. Destination Business Groups are mentioned but it should be noted that some of these groups are currently fragile and the future of some of them is uncertain due to lack of public sector funding. There is perhaps scope to strengthen the Destination National Park Group to help drive forward some of these initiatives but in reality it will be down to the efforts of individual businesses to deliver a thriving visitor economy.

We note there is a refence to the Scottish Futures Trust as a lead delivery partner. This perhaps needs some explanation as we are not aware of this Trust supporting the range of priorities identified under VE3 in the past.

Under VE4 given the nature of the actions featured here we would suggest the list of local delivery partners is extended to include the Your Park Stakeholders Group, Loch Lomond Association and the Friends. LLA has already made a positive contribution to promoting responsible use of the Loch Lomond islands

Support delivery partners should include Community Councils as a number have been active in helping to address litter issue

Q22 Do you agree with the overarching Rural Development vision? In the National Park businesses and communities thrive and people live and work sustainably in a high quality environment.

Yes, Comments:

while we recognise the importance of tourism and recreation to the economy of the National Park there are very few references to other sectors of the rural economy and this should be addressed in the final version of the PPP. It is important more efforts are made to diversify the rural economy and some bold actions require to be identified, perhaps with the assistance of Scottish Enterprise and Highlands and Islands Enterprise, who hardly feature as delivery partners under specific rural development and visitor experience outcomes and priorities in the current version of the PPP. We consider these agencies should be tasked, along with local authorities, in helping to deliver a more diversified rural economy and sustainable economic growth. They should also have a role in helping to deliver improvements to the public realm in places other than simply Balloch where Scottish Enterprise has a longstanding interest through their ownership of West Riverside and involvement at Loch Lomond Shores. We agree with the vision for rural development which captures in a few words the essence of what we should be collectively aiming for with thriving businesses and communities in a high quality environment.

National Park Partnership Plan: A view to 2018 - 2023

Q23 Do you agree with the 4 Rural Development outcomes?

We also agree with the 4 rural development outcomes but would suggest RD3 is modified to include a reference to providing more affordable housing. Housing is mentioned in the text on page 38 but doesn't appear as part of the RD3 outcome which we consider is unfortunate, Revised RD3 could read "Population decline is being addressed by attracting and retaining more skilled working age and young people and providing more affordable housing within the National Park. Generally the number of actions could be reduced and simplified as there is some duplication and overlap. Rightly there is a refence under RD1 to the considerable effort made by the NPA and the Community Partnership to engage effectively with communities through charrettes and community action planning over the past 5 years and we believe the emphasis should now be on helping to secure the necessary funding to deliver the actions and designs articulated in the various plans that have been produced. There are some opportunities to secure funding from local authorities, City Region Deals and Sustrans for some of this work but we consider this should be augmented by SE and the NPA to ensure an ambitious programme is delivered over the next 5 years. Some of the smaller villages such as Arrochar, Drymen, Aberfoyle and Balmaha would also benefit from some public sector support for public realm/townscape enhancements. We welcome the plans to continue supporting the Community Partnership and communities under RD4 as there is likely to be more reliance in the future on local communities delivering actions that improve their quality of life and place. Increasingly with new legislation empowering local communities there will be a greater move to communities owning and managing assets such as car parks which we consider would be a positive step forward in enhancing the quality of village environments and particularly if they are linked to income generating opportunities to support the re-instatement of village officers and other public realm improvement initiatives.

Q24 Do you agree with the 19 Rural Development priorities?

Do you have any specific comments on the priorities?:

There is some duplication in RD priorities 1 and 2 with communities such as Callander, Arrochar and Balloch mentioned twice. There is scope to merge both these priorities. We agree there will be a need for some prioritisation but this should be augmented by a village improvement grant scheme grant scheme with grants of £10,000 -£50,000 for community led public realm improvement schemes. This would make a real difference in communities such as Balmaha, Drymen and Aberfoyle. We welcome the inclusion of RD priority 9 as in the past rural development strategies for the National Park have tended to focus on tourism-related businesses and there is an urgent need to diversify the rural economy. The provision of workspaces and small industrial/office units will help achieve this. We are impressed by the efforts that have been made by the likes of Atholl Estates in the Cairngorms National Park to provide a cluster of workspaces on the edge of Blair Atholl which enjoys high occupancy level and this would be a good case study to consider in taking forward any initiative in the LL&TNP. We welcome the emphasis on skills development and the reference to the success of the now defunct Skills Partnership which enjoyed some success during the limited timespan of its existence. It was very unfortunate that the short-lived Skills Partnership could not be sustained due to lack of funding support and it is important lessons are learned from this initiative which took a considerable amount of time and effort to establish in the first place. Priorities 11-13 which all deal with skills could be easily wrapped up into one all-encompassing skills priority and it is questionable whether the NPA's own requirements under the Developing Young Workforce agenda should be singled out for specific mention-surely this should relate to all the public sector partners and efforts should be made to engage local businesses in this too

When public realm improvement schemes are being considered it is important the needs of local businesses are listened to and acted upon as there is a danger of some schemes reducing car parking close to businesses which could undermine their viability. This fear was widely expressed by businesses in Balloch as part of the recent LIVE PARK consultation exercise on design options for the main street and station square
