We refer to your request for information, received by email on 19 June 2025. The information you have requested is environmental information, as defined in Regulation 2 of the Environmental Information (Scotland) Regulations 2004 (EIRs). We have therefore applied the exemption in section 39(2) of FOISA and dealt with your request under the EIRs alone.

I am wanting to find out what the LLTNPA has said and done about FLS' proposed Larch Removal Plan in Strathyre - their consultation log on the proposal indicates the LLTNPA has been consulted. Please could you provide me with:

- a) All written communications and records of any meeting held with FLS about the Larch Removal Plan including arrangements for consultation with the public
- b) The LLTNPA's response or responses to the subsequent statutory consultation by Scottish Forestry
- c) Any notes of internal meeting, emails between staff or communications with board members about the Larch Removal Plan
- d) Any written communications or notes of meetings etc with SEPA about the pollution risks to the river system, a Special Area of Conservation

Hi _____,

Sorry I'm a few days late with this but with the public consultation not until tomorrow, I'm assuming I haven't totally missed the boat. Comments listed below:

- 1. This is a large scale and complex plan covering a wide area over the next five years which will have widespread access implications, albeit at a smaller site based scale at different locations and different years. The overall impact for recreational users of FLS land in the Strathyre/ Balquhidder area for the next five years will be one of regular path closures/ diversions and loss of amenity because of vehicle movements and potential damage to routes associated with felling and harvesting. There are 49 coupes in Strathyre West, 33 in Strathyre East and 14 in Kirkton and a range of core paths, rights of way and promoted routes such as NCN7 and the Rob Roy Way will be affected as well as less formal but equally important local walking routes and the mountain bike trails in Kirkton. It is not possible to comment on almost 100 individual coupes but as a rule of thumb, we would expect that all operations follow the managing forestry operations and access best practice guidance
 - https://www.forestry.gov.scot/publications/352-managing-woodland-access-and-forest-operations-in-scotland/viewdocument/352 In particular, as most felling work takes place during the week, closures and diversions should be lifted at weekends wherever possible and signs/ barriers taken down. Clear and advance communication with a range of stakeholders and local communities is going to be key to manage public access during this period. We note the development of Public Access Management Plans (PAMP) to manage and mitigate restrictions to public access as part of detailed work planning processes and we welcome further consultation on these at the appropriate time.
- 2. The Rob Roy Way (RRW) is most impacted by the SLaRP as it passes through the entirety of Strathyre East and West. NCN7 also passes through Strathyre West and we assume from the maps and information on haulage routes that parts of these

routes will be used for timber transport to the Keip Farm and Bochastle access points in Strathyre West. These are regionally and nationally important routes and are incredibly popular with all types of user. Closure of these routes should be an absolute last resort and any diversions should be comparable in terms of condition and function (widths, surfaces and gradients) for the range of users (walkers, cyclists, horse-riders) and their abilities (long distance walkers, dog walkers, family cycling etc.). The RRW in Strathyre East passes through 10 coupes that are either going to be clear or selective felled and thinned and these operations cover a four year period from 2026 to 2030. Thought needs to be given as to how this will be managed either by individual and short duration closures/ diversions or a long term and agreed diversion route to cover the whole period. The obvious alternative route is along NCN7 from Strathyre to Kingshouse but we also think a route through the forest should be maintained as much as possible. To that effect, there is a high level route option, taking forest roads alongside the Allt Chreagain up to 350m and then rising and contouring north between 400 and 450m before dropping back down towards the Kingshouse. As above, we will welcome the opportunity to further comment on issues such as this through the PAMP process.

- 3. We also note the ash condition map and that many of the ash identified for felling lie on/ adjacent to the line of the RRW and NCN7. Some of this is owned and managed by the NPA, notably the section immediately west of Bochastle/ the A821. Our Estates/ Land Operations Teams should be informed and consulted with on any works in this area and, as with point 2 above, the route should remain open as much as possible during any felling.
- 4. The timings of works in affected coupes will need careful management to avoid 'double closures' to key attractions/ destinations such as popular hills. Ben Ledi is a potential example. Coupes 82707 and 82588 are earmarked for thinning in 2029-30. Both have access routes to the summit of Ben Ledi passing through them, one from the Ben Ledi car park next to Corriechrombie Bridge and one from Bochastle car park. This felling needs to be scheduled so while one coupe is worked and with potential access restrictions, the other remains open as an alternative/ diversion route. This principle applies to other routes such as Stank Glen and in Kirkton Glen.
- 5. There are a number of rights of way that cross hills into other glens that are affected by these proposals. These are the old coffin route from Strathyre to Immeroin across the southern flanks of Beinn an t-Sithein, from Laggan to Immeroin and most notably the route through Kirkton Glen over to Glen Dochart past Lochan an Eireannaich and Rob Roy's Putting Stone at an altitude of 600m/ 2,000 feet. These are all routes with historical and cultural associations and where they cross affected coupes, the condition of these should be recorded and restored as appropriate and if necessary post operations. Again, they should remain open wherever possible.
- 6. The dominant recreational use within Kirkton Glen is walking, hillwalking and mountain biking. There are two core paths, one from Balquhidder Church and the other from Tullochmhor Farm, that converge further up the Glen and continue over the high bealach down to Glen Dochart. The right of way is associated with Rob Roy and the droving of livestock. There is also a network of mountain bike trails within the lower section of Kirkton Glen and these are maintained by a local mountain bike

association called the Balquhidder Mountain Bike Trails Group and, in the past at least, were authorised by Forestry and Land Scotland. We would also like to see FLS/ Scottish Forestry liaise with the Balquhidder Mountain Bike Trails Group to ensure that the existing mountain bike trails are taken into account by the proposed felling and options for reinstatement/ realignment are explored and agreed. There are other opportunities to improve the right of way at the head of the glen. Where the right of way leaves the existing forest road (grid ref. 523237) it has become encroached by Sitka regen and growth and it difficult to pass through in places. Also there are two fences in close proximity at the head of the plantation (see photo attached) with a stile in the outer fence which obstructs the right of way for mountain bikers and horse-riders. Coupe 80035 is very close to this site so there is an opportunity to improve and rationalise access here by clearing encroachment on the right of way and improving the access around the fences. The fence with the stile is not owned by FLS but is not continuous and therefore a bit redundant. In an area that is going to see significant access disruption over a five year period this would be a good news story and one in which we could possibly help facilitate e.g. provide a gate if the fencing could be realigned. We accept though that this may be more of a subject for the LMP renewal than this plan.

7. Although obviously not an access team remit we agree with Claire's comments about the re-stocking of Kirkton Glen. There is an opportunity to increase mixed broadleaf planting at the southern face, alongside the core path and right of way and towards the head of the site so commercial crops give way to a more scattered and open upland woodland of Scots Pine, Birch and Rowan etc. This would be a much more attractive environment for recreational users but again we accept this is may be for the LMP renewal plan and not this plan.

We hope all is well with you. Please can you confirm who the forestry lead is in LLTNP, is it

CSRSG has significant concerns regarding the proposed Strathyre FLS woodland plan which is currently out to consultation. This area has been managed as Continuous Cover Forestry and with mixed conifer stands for a very long time to the benefit of local raptor populations. the proposals seem to involve the removal of significant areas of mature trees. Plant Health Notices around larch removal are used by FLS as the normal excuse for intervention, however we note also However that larch is a relatively small proportion of the trees that are planned to be felled. We have made our views known to FLS however we are unclear as to how our representation will be properly considered. We also think that there is a strong case for large parts of this area to be transformed to native woodland over time, and therefore not re-planted predominantly with Sitka Spruce. In addition to raptors there are significant concerns we hear around red squirrels.

We look forward to hearing from you. We are very keen to hear also what LLTNP are saying about these FLS proposals?

Thank you for these thoughts. You might need to explain the "SLARP approach"! This is new terminology to me.

The removal of larch under SPHNs is only a small part of this proposal, and whilst we understand this legal requirement on FLS, frankly it looks like it is being used as a bit of an excuse to remove other mature stands of conifer retentions at the same time (including areas which have been managed for decades as CCF)! These mature stands of timber of sufficient scale are critical for the retention of the local raptor populations. We monitor raptors both on and off the NFE and it would seem that FLS are generally the most assiduous landowner in wanting to get rid of larch. Larch is an important tree species for nesting raptors so alternative suitable mature trees (Scots Pine, Douglas Fir etc.) at scale-ideally CCF as at present in the Strathyre corridor- must be left if all the larch is all going to be removed. Sitka spruce is generally a least preferred nesting tree and related woodland structure for breeding raptors.

We have offered to speak to FLS as part of this consultation and advise them on the needs of local raptor populations. We thank you at LLTNP for making the same point to SF. We would welcome some further clarity around timescales as to when this engagement will take place.

All is good here thanks. And thanks for flagging this up. is our Trees and Woodland Advisor dealing with this SLARP consultation. He has already flagged up raptors as a sensitivity with FLS, advising them to consult the Raptor Study Group. We have also flagged raptors with Scottish Forestry as the regulator. The SLARP approach is being used to get better outcomes than would arise from reactive compulsory felling due to multiple SPHNs. It allows more time to get the details right.

You don't often get email from . Learn why this is important

FLS already has most if not all of the information regarding breeding raptors in the Strathyre area. They are partners in the Scottish Raptor Monitoring Scheme so can access this information also via this route. Much of the data has been collected by FLS's own Conservation Rangers over many years so surely they should be engaged properly to give their advice as well. The problem is that FLS has moved to a standing sales contracting model so they are now handing over most of the harvesting to private contractors, which entails big risks from our point of view as many of these contractors do not have or employ

adequate ecological surveyors for pre-felling checks. What we need to see is FLS draw up a full mitigation plan including long term retentions of commercial timber blocks of sufficient scale and for these plans to be shared with CSRSG to agree. It is surely not up to us to do all of the work for them here? We are a voluntary body with no professional paid staff. It would help if LLTNP can reinforce this point.

I see that the Strathyre community is now objecting to these FLS proposals and has raised a public petition. The CSRSG agree with the community action and concerns. In our view LLTNP should be intervening to get a workable solution here.

	arded me your emails regarding the Strathyre Strategic Larch Removal Plan am duly getting in touch as promised.

The SLaRP has now been or is about to be approved but if necessary FLS can make changes; depending on the extent and timing of the change, this can be done be exchange of email or by formal amendment.

In order to protect the raptor population as effectively as possible, it would be helpful if you could explain your concerns – specifically for breeding raptors and specifically in relation to the SLaRP felling areas as shown on the attached Management map (which shows clearfell, thinning and select felling for the larch removal). Once we understand these concerns and have adequate supporting information (eg. details of those nests impacted by the larch proposals), we can engage with FLS (and SF if appropriate) to ensure that suitable mitigation planning for these known breeding raptors (and indeed for any new finds) is incorporated into the SLaRP.

The Strathyre Land Management Plan (LMP) renewal has been simultaneously progressing, taking in the entire Strathyre holding. The LMP is a much more substantial piece of work, covering a 20 year period, with the first 10 years in detail, and widely consulting on all aspects of managing the forest environment. The SLaRP will feed into the LMP so the latter is fully informed. There will be an opportunity to feed into the consultation for the LMP.

Hi all,
We?ve been receiving emails from about concerns over protection of raptor nests at Strathyre as larch felling progresses, and in particular impacts on long-term retention (he was keen for us to respond to the SF consultation with his concerns, but his emails have come in after the deadline). I?ve already advised him that more comprehensive plans are being developed in the LMP.
He claims that ?The problem is that FLS has moved to a standing sales contracting model so they are now handing over most of the harvesting to private contractors, which entails big risks from our point of view as many of these contractors do not have or employ adequate ecological surveyors for pre-felling checks.? Can you shed some light on this please? I know FLS use various methods for implementing harvesting, it would be helpful to understand what methods are being used /planned at Strathyre and to what extent. To follow on from that, would it be possible to include a specific raptor nest mitigation plan in
the SLaRP and LMP, including mapped mitigation? I understand there is a need to keep the nest sites of these birds out of the public arena, but such a document/addendum could be kept confidential (we often see this in EIAs for planning applications). Currently Section C.1.12 (Biodiversity) of the SLaRP refers generally to following guidelines and local Environment staff advice. It would be helpful if this could be made more detailed, identifying the raptor species present, their location and the appropriate mitigation. A map accompanied by a table would I think be sufficient.
I understand this is something that would normally be reserved for operational planning, but it does seem appropriate, given the sensitivity of these birds, to include it at the earlier more strategic planning stage.
If it would be helpful to discuss this, I?d be happy to. Kind regards,

Simon,

I hope all is well with you.

representing members of the Strathyre Community and their concerns, and myself representing Central Scotland Raptor Study Group, are seeking to get a meeting with FLS regarding their current forestry plans around Strathyre. We have also been in contact with Councillor Martin Earl who is helpfully assisting us with this case.

CSRSG has already written to FLS as part of the current Strathyre consultation exercise to indicate that we wish to have proper and detailed conversations about the protection of raptor breeding sites in the area. We have had no response back as of yet and are unclear whether Scottish Forestry are taking our views on board despite raptor protection being flagged as a consideration by the original consultation email. FLS hold all of the data for these breeding raptors through their membership and involvement in the Scottish Raptor Monitoring Scheme. We suggest that they use this data and their in house conservation expertise to produce a thorough raptor breeding site mitigation plan which we can then scrutinise and indicate whether it is adequate. We are volunteers and we feel that it is really up to FLS to do this work rather than us. At the moment it looks like they will be removing

much of the mature stands of continuous cover forestry which have been in situ for decades and it is our firm view that this will be to the detriment of breeding raptors in the area. This will also almost certainly also impact red squirrels and badgers as well and expert advice should be obtained for the future conservation of these species as well.


Longer term we also think that there should be a transition to native woodland along this corridor linking up Leny and Balquhidder oak woodlands. We need some vision and imagination here from FLS rather than just more rotations of mainly Sitka spruce. Surely the LLTNP as part of its Future Nature Strategy should also be stepping in to make these kind of points in such an important and scenic road corridor through the Park?

We would like LLTNP to attend the meeting with FLS when it happens. We would be grateful if you could confirm?

Hi ,

As per previous email, I am sending you the feedbacks from the site visit with the National Park regarding our Larch Plan proposal for Strathyre.

I think that the National Park was generally favourable with our approach to the pre-emptive larch felling plan.

- 1-We have explained the general approach that we took in order to create coupe shapes that would minimise landscaping impact. The visit was focused on the part of the plan where the impact of felling would be most visible for the community and visitors in the area. It was accepted that large areas of clearfell in specific areas visible from the tourist stopping points and from Balquhidder would be less impactful in the landscape.
- 2- We have explained the approach for choosing clear-felling in some areas vs thinning where more appropriate.
- 3-We discussed our approach to finalise restocking at LMP stage and that the restocking proposal was at the moment just a reflection of the current approved plan, however it would

be tuned at LMP stage to ensure it will meet wider objectives. There will be likely minimal restocking by the time the LMP is approved, due to LMP being renewed in a couple of years.

- 4-We have explained that further engagement with Nature Scots and the communities would take place to discuss our proposal for which they agreed, was something they would like to see.
- 5- Regarding Kirkton more specifically, we have discuss the idea behind felling such a large coupe in the front of the block and explain the reasoning behind it (risk of windblow, landscaping impact, potential for restocking and protection of soft conifers/ broadleaves in an area heavily affected by Deer population). We have been open about the feedbacks that we have received from our Environmental Team regarding the effect of felling on squirrel population. The Environmental Team is concerned that the amount of felling would decrease the capacity to sustain a viable squirrel population. These concerns were drawn from population modal, however there is acceptance that the population is potentially not viable at the moment. However mitigations will be put in place and Nature Scots will be consulted in the process. They have agreed that these may be seen as an issue by the community, however openness during engagement with communities would be the best approach.

I think I have covered most points discussed on site.

Thanks for consulting with LLTNPA and sending through the various attachments.


I found the format of the LRP incredibly helpful; it was very easy to follow. The Context of felling area (Appendix 4) is a useful addition.

In Section C.1.12 (Biodiversity) it would be prudent to include Scottish Raptor Study Group as a consultee for appropriate mitigation and advice.

We?re pleased that there is an opportunity for the local community to view and discuss the LRP.

We understand the constraints in felling the Kirkton face and its impact on the landscape, and our landscape adviser is on board with the proposed felling sequence. At restocking however, we would encourage the inclusion of broadleaves along the southern edge to buffer Balquhidder village (see below, yellow elipses).

Although landscape has been discussed in the context of Landscape Character type, there is no mention of the NP?s Special Landscape Qualities (SLQs) in the plan, which is a key feature of the NP?s designation. Reference to the SLQs should be made and to help inform restocking design. The plan area is within the Breadalbane landscape area and both the summary of Breadalbane?s SLQs and the more specific sub-region SLQs should be assessed to inform the restocking design. You?II need the SLQ report for this.

I was slightly premature in hitting the send button. Further to my email below, just a couple more points:

?<u>Special Landscape Qualities - Guidance on assessing effects</u>? should be used to inform the plan. The Trees and Woodland Strategy <u>Landscape Capacity Study</u> and <u>Toolkit</u> may also serve as helpful proxies for landscape impact assessment.

With those in mind and the challenges at the Kirkton block, the restocking design of the front face? from the south end to around the dyke which goes east-west, being the most visible part? should consider a significant reduction in, or complete removal of, the productive element to avoid the same landscape challenges in the next rotation.

With the public consultation next week, it will probably be helpful if there are landscape visualisations. I know that the necessity of the felling is not up for discussion, but it?s about providing appropriate means by which to inform the uninformed.

Overall, we?re pleased to see the diversification of species in the Strathyre LMP, including greater proportions of mixed conifers and a significant increase in native broadleaves.

Thank you for your comments.

Hi

I shall make a mention of the Raptor group and SLQ?s in the final draft of the larch plan.

I have forwarded your comments regarding future restocking proposal to as he will be reviewing the LMP for the three forest blocks in a couple of years? time.

It is worth mentioning that this plan is essentially a felling permission, and that we have been asked to use the currently approved restocking proposal or in the case of Kirkton the last LMP restocking approval as a mean to essentially? tick boxes?.

We are however aware that the current restocking proposal, especially for Kirkton which was last approved in 2008, is clearly out of date and does not meet UKWAS requirements and other objectives in the NP. It will be unlikely that any restocking will take place in Kirkton and most of the forest blocks within the next few years. If it is the case, the restocking will be

reviewed and amended by to ensure it will fit with the NP SLQ?s plan and the objectives of the future LMP (ie PAWS restoration?etc?).

We have prepared landscape visualisations for the large coupe in Kirkton, which offers 3 scenarios (please see attached for info). However we have only sent the visualisation for the proposed shape to SF to avoid confusion (this will need refining with scale and grid reference). The three scenarios will be used during the engagement as a mean of comparing the various options if necessary. We are still in the process of refining the engagement format, but I think this will be a good idea to inform the uninformed as you mentioned.

However it has been agreed with SF that only a visualisation for the felling at Kirkton was necessary for the larch plan. However may be able to answer you regarding providing further visualisation at LMP stage.

I hope I have covered most of your points, and please do not hesitate to get in touch if you have more questions regarding this Larch Plan.

Hi

I just wanted to clarify a point I made yesterday, so it is not misconstrued.

It was agreed with SF to refer to the previous plan for the restocking proposal as a mean to accelerate the process of the felling permission. Since the three blocks were due for their full LMP review, it was agreed that the restocking was going to be fully revised at the full LMP stage in approximately 2 years? time. There should be no felling in Kirkton before 26/27 and the large coupe should be programmed later, by which point we should have the full LMP approved before it is time to restock.

As I mentioned for the larch plan we have agreed on a ?like for like? restocking proposal mirroring past plans, however we completely agree that most of the restocking in Kirkton especially is not fit matching today ?s requirements.

I just wanted to clarify that it was not just a tick box exercise but just a mean to ensure we have more time to think thoroughly about the restocking proposal and not rush to create a restocking proposal fit for purpose.

Hi all,

We've been receiving emails from about concerns over protection of raptor nests at Strathyre as larch felling progresses, and in particular impacts on long-term retention (he was keen for us to respond to the SF consultation with his concerns, but his emails have come in after the deadline). I've already advised him that more comprehensive plans are being developed in the LMP.

He claims that 'The problem is that FLS has moved to a standing sales contracting model so they are now handing over most of the harvesting to private contractors, which entails big risks from our point of view as many of these contractors do not have or employ adequate ecological surveyors for pre-felling checks.' Can you shed some light on this please? I know FLS use various methods for implementing harvesting, it would be helpful to understand what methods are being used /planned at Strathyre and to what extent.

To follow on from that, would it be possible to include a specific raptor nest mitigation plan in the SLaRP and LMP, including mapped mitigation? I understand there is a need to keep the nest sites of these birds out of the public arena, but such a document/addendum could be kept confidential (we often see this in EIAs for planning applications). Currently Section C.1.12 (Biodiversity) of the SLaRP refers generally to following guidelines and local Environment staff advice. It would be helpful if this could be made more detailed, identifying

the raptor species present, their location and the appropriate mitigation. A map accompanied by a table would I think be sufficient.

I understand this is something that would normally be reserved for operational planning, but it does seem appropriate, given the sensitivity of these birds, to include it at the earlier more strategic planning stage.

If it would be helpful to discuss this, I'd be happy to.
